## French-Speaking Student Explains Stand At NFCUS

EDMONTON (CP) — A French-Canadian student Tuesday told the 27th annual congress of the National Federation of Canadian University Students that French students who work for the federation are sometimes considered "traitors."

Speaking in English, Frederic Arsenault, of the University of New Brunswick and president of the Maritimes region of the NFCUS, said: "Many French students who have worked for the federation have been called traitors by their own people." He explained there was a feeling they were wasting their time and talents in an organization that had unequal and inadequate French representation. "I don't believe the French universities are out to wreck this federation," he said, "but we must recognize their right to self-determination."

### RESOLUTION TO COME

The NFCUS executive has proposed, in a resolution yet to come before the conference for a vote, that French students be given greater status on the executive. Its proposal would provide for two vice-presidents, one elected by a caucus of French-speaking students and other by English-speaking students.

The executive's resolution also recommends establishment of a board of director to be comprised of the president, the two vice-presidents, three English-speaking representatives and three French-speaking representatives.

The current executive comprises a president, a vice-president for national affairs, a vice-president for international af-

## Business Briefs

OTTAWA (CP) — Railway carloadings in Canada in the seven days ended Sept. 21 rose 3.9 per cent to 79,833 from the same period a year earlier, the bureau of statistics said Wednesday.

This brought loadings in the Jan. 1-Sept. 21 period to 2,533,900 cars, down 1.2 per cent from a year earlier. Receipts from connections advanced 2.2 per cent in the seven days to 22,911 cars but dropped 4.4 per cent in the cumulative period to 828,322 cars.

Railway operating revenues in May increased 14.8 per cent to \$115,336,827 compared with the same month last year, while operating expenses advanced 1.4 per cent to \$96,468,629. There was a net operating income in May of \$18,068,198 compared with \$5,794,176 in May of last year.

Rail operating revenues, comprising railway, express, commercial communications and highway transport rail services, amounted to \$126,573,970 in the month, up 13.2 per cent from a year previous. Operating expenses totalled \$106,601,963, a gain of 1.6 per cent. Net rail operating income rose in the month to \$19,894,107 from \$6,607,068 a year earlier.

Freight cleared through Canadian canals in July rose 20.3 per cent to 9,833,707 tons from 8,183,902 in the same month last year. Gains were recorded by the Welland, St. Lawrence and two of the smaller canals. Freight shipped through the

combined Canada-United States (St. Lawrence) canals increased 4.5 per cent in July to 12,953,283 tons from 12,414,903 last year. The total through the Canadian lock was down 17.4 per cent to 132,738 tons. Traffic through the Welland Canal advanced 15.4 per cent to 3,367,725 tons from 4,667,503 in July of last year, while traffic through the St. Lawrence canals increased 31.8 per cent to 4,173,044 tons from 3,167,153.

Production of refined beet and cane sugar advanced 7.4 per cent in August to 190,827,000 pounds from 168,387,000 in the same month last year. Sales rose 1 per cent to 190,310,000 pounds from 180,178,000.

In the January-August period output was up slightly at 1,066,032,000 pounds from 1,004,652,000 a year previous while sales were down two per cent at 1,196,146,000 pounds. Company-held stocks at the end of August were 32.7 per cent greater than a year ago at 213,040,000 pounds.
