In Memoriam

WILLIAM H. ACOBN

In the passing of William H. Acorn, whose death occurred at his home, 37 Oriber Street, on Tuesday, June 19, this city lost one of its oldest and most highly respected residents, and the last surviving member of a large family.

Born at Dundas, P. E. Island, Nov. 25th, 1857, the late Mr. Acorn learned the trade of blacksmith. He later entered the firm of McKinnon and McLean where he added to his store of mechanical knowledge, serving his apprenticeship as a machinist.

When the present firm of Bruce Stewart & Co. was organized he became associated with this firm, remaining with them until his death.

Known as a competent and skillful workman, of sober and industrious habits, he earned the respect of both associates and employers.

He leaves the following sons and daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father: Edward F., Raymond G., and Percy of this city and William of Toronto, who arrived home to attend his father's funeral, Mrs. Pogson, Saint John, Mrs. Wm. McElman, Dorchester, Mass., and Mrs. Clifford Smith, all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

Mrs. Acorn (nee Margaret Jane French) predeceased her husband Feb. 6th, 1923.

The funeral was held from his late residence Wednesday, June 19th, at People's Cemetery, Rev. H. L. Denton officiating at the house and grave.

INFORMATION BUREAU AT AULAC—Construction of the new Prince Edward Island Information Bureau at Aulac was started early last week and is expected to be completed early in July. The building will be a one storey bungalow type, twenty-five feet in length by sixteen feet in width. Mounted on top of the front of the building will be a polished steel ball, six feet in diameter. At the southwest corner of the building a forty-two foot tower seven feet square is to be erected. This tower will afford an excellent view of the Tantramar Dykelands and Fort Beauséjour as well as the rest of the surrounding country. The bureau, located at the junction of the Cape Tormentine-Sackville-Amherst highway, will be the Maritime Cabins. The construction work is being done by Mr. Charles Ramsay, contractor of Summerside, P. E. I., who has four men working with him at present. Mr. George Inman, of Summerside, opened the present P. E. I. Information Bureau at the Maritime Cabins on Saturday, June 10. Mr. Inman, a former Mount Allison University student and now a medical student at Dalhousie University, has been in charge of the Island Information Bureau at Aulac for the past three summers—Sackville Tribune.
