

The Three Days Walking Match.

SUMMERSIDE, Sept. 22.
When it was announced through the papers some time ago that a three days go-as-you-please match of twelve hours a day for a purse of \$100 a side and two-thirds the gate money, had been arranged to take place in Ludlow Hall, on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th of September, between Eph. Clow and the Unknown, of New Brunswick, few people took much interest in the statement. Some looked upon the announcement as a "dodge," but their reasons for so doing were kept to themselves. It was not until within the past week that any real interest began to be manifested by our townsfolk in the contest. During the week Mr. Clow was in town making the necessary arrangements for the match, and during that time he has made many friends. Clow's record as an athlete was pretty generally known to a number of our sporting men, and if wishes avail him anything he has the best wishes of our people. Who the Unknown could be was the question asked by many, but none could answer the question satisfactorily. On the afternoon of the 21st it was rumored that Merritt was the Unknown with whom Clow had to contend. To find out, if possible, the correctness of this report, and to see what effect it would have upon Mr. Clow, we called upon him at the hall where we found him finishing the arrangements for the morning's contest. After stating our business and enquiring as to what he thought of the Unknown, Mr. Clow said that he was perfectly satisfied to meet Merritt. He had been engaged in a contest with Merritt before, and he was not afraid to meet him again. He said Merritt was a hard man to beat, and that if he won he would have to work for it. He said he felt in good condition himself, and was confident of success. He would do his best to win a victory. "If Merritt proved the victor," said Clow, "I will shake hands with him, and acknowledge it."

The track which has been laid out under Mr. Clow's own supervision, is a good one, being composed of tan-bark and saw-dust. The track measures twenty-five laps to the mile, and is about four feet broad. At the last walking match held here, the contestants had to walk on the bare floor, and measured thirty-three laps to the mile. The difference being that in the present case, the track takes in the largest part of the hall, the seats being arranged inside the track for the accommodation of those who attend. In the former match, those who witnessed it, were allowed to stand outside the track.

On Tuesday evening the Unknown in company with Harry Hart, his backer, and a few others arrived here. This morning Finlay McNeill, was chosen referee and starter. Geo. Campbell of Summerside, scored for Unknown, and Henry Crossman of Bedouque, scored for Clow. Chas. Lafferty, Marker. At a few minutes to eleven, the men were called up, and a few remarks addressed to them by Mr. McNeill. At sharp eleven the men were sent off. Unknown took the lead closely followed by Clow. Thence as they travel around the track appear to good advantage, and it would be hard to say at present, which of the two is likely to gain the victory. There is a difference in the style and build of the two men. Clow's tall and slightly bent form as he goes around the track is quite a contrast to that of the Unknown. The Unknown is short and well built, and as he goes around the track, with his head down, and body bent forward, he appears to be at home. Clow recognises his friends by a slight nod of the head and keeps at his old jog, while at a nod or a word from his backer the Unknown will "let out" a little of his speed. For the first two hours there was not much of a change in the respective positions of the two men. At a quarter to one, Clow left the track, but returned in a few minutes. Unknown took advantage of this, and added three laps to his lead. On the appearance of Clow on the track, he came down to his old speed again. At the 21st mile, Clow slipped and fell, striking the ground rather heavily, but jumping to his feet in a second, was off again as though an accident had never happened to him. After being on the run until nearly two o'clock, the men stopped running and struck out on a walk. At two o'clock Clow had gained on his opponent—Unknown being but 3 laps ahead. During the next two hours the Unknown spurted, and at four o'clock the score stood: Unknown, 24 miles, 11 laps; Clow, 23 miles, 23 laps. At five o'clock, the Unknown had increased his lead by 14 laps—the score standing: Unknown, 29 miles, 20 laps; Clow 29 miles, 6 laps. During the evening Clow left the track two or three times. It is the general opinion that Clow is holding back, and that during the evening he will put on some extra speed and run the Unknown for all he is worth. Music is supplied by an organ and violin.

Unknown, 86 miles, 20 laps,
Clow, 86 miles, 9 laps.
Unknown leading by 11 laps.

EUROPEAN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 21.

It is officially announced that Essod Pasha has been appointed Turkish Ambassador to France.

The Porte addressed a note to representatives abroad, on the 17th inst., stating that it desired to cede territory to Montenegro in order to prevent bloodshed, but the naval demonstration is an exercise of armed pressure, contrary to the rights of the Sultan, and the Porte, therefore, casts upon the Powers all responsibility for the agitation among the Mahomedans and events which may result therefrom.

PARIS, Sept. 21.

The negotiations to determine upon the selection of a Minister of Foreign Affairs, continue. Seven Ministers, who have not resigned, will retain their portfolio. Some of the evening papers say that the position of Minister of Foreign Affairs has been offered to M. Fissot.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

The Reichsbote (Conservative) says: In summoning this Ministry, President Grevy is digging his own grave. Gambetta will, before long, have filled all the ministerial and diplomatic posts with his creatures. He will then replace M. Grevy. Gambetta's name signifies war to the knife against the church and revenge against Germany.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

Laycock took a short spin yesterday. Tricket did not go out.

Hanlan had a few spins in front of his boat house, and treated the spectators to some splendid bursts of speed in his new boat, with which he is highly pleased.

Elliot also had a short spin, but is still stiff, and must lose considerable weight before the race.

BERLIN, Sept. 21.

Emperor William is suffering from fatigue and cold on account of recent manoeuvres.

QUEENSTOWN, Sept. 21.

Arrived, S. S. "Prussian," from Baltimore. Lost boats, davits and 154 head of cattle.

Steamer "Prince Edward," from Montreal, has arrived with loss of foretopmast.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.

A schooner with diving apparatus has found a sunken vessel in the Hudson River east of Chapin's Island, near Dundeeberg Mountain, which is believed to be Captain Kidd's craft. She is 17 feet under mud and water, and is believed to contain \$200,000.

The boiler of a rolling mill at Dover, N. J., exploded yesterday and was hurled 80 feet, crushing the stack-house. One laborer was killed; five were badly and seven slightly scalded.

GREEN BAY, Sept. 21.

A disastrous fire here on Monday destroyed 60 dwelling houses, 30 barns and the Presbyterian church. The residences burned were among the best in the city. The flames only stopped when they reached the river. Loss \$170,000; insurance light.

MEMPHIS, Sept. 21.

There will be a jubilee here to-morrow over the good health of the city this year. Several Governors of adjoining States will be present.

BOSTON, Sept. 21.

The Journal says: Returns from Maine indicate that the legislature will only be able to decide the gubernatorial question upon the face of unofficial returns received and estimate those to come on the vote of last year. Plaisted is elected by a plurality of 99.

Epizootic among the horses of Boston has extended to nearly every stable and a good deal of inconvenience is likely to result.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. Sept. 21.

Last evening President Hayes visited the rooms of the Republican League and remained an hour. He was welcomed by Gov. Law, President of the League, and introduced to many leading Republicans of the city.

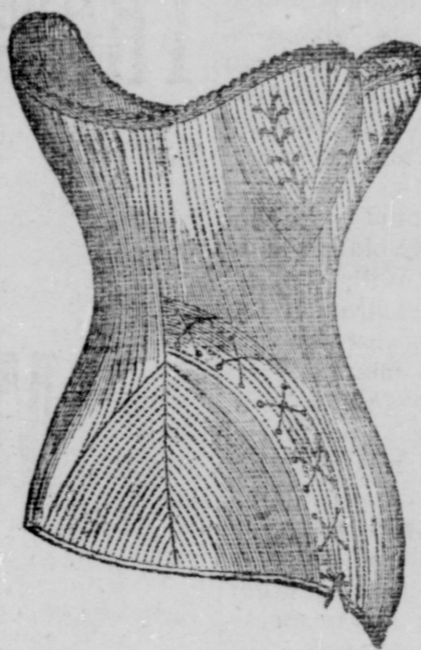
