TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 5. Several farmers in Russell county, believing that the world is coming to an end on the 19th of June, have neglected putting in their crops.

FREDERICTON, June 5

The Metropolitan and the Rev. Dr. Kingdon, Coadjutor Bishop elect, arrived here by the train from St. John on Friday evening and were met at the station by a large number of the clergy and laity of Fredericton. These gentlemen were introduced to Rev. Mr. Kingdon, after which that gentleman was driven to the residence of the Metropolitan.

The Rev. Mr. Kingdon conducted both services at the Cathedral to-day, but to the great disappointment of many he preached at neither. The Rev. gentleman is a rapid speaker, his voice, though sharp, is clear and distinct and, by the way, it filled the church, and its peculiarly musical and lengthened tone at times, conveys the impression that he is accustomed to large buildings and chanted services. His manner of conducting the services, though somewhat different from what the Cathedral congregation are accustomed to, was nevertheless pleasing and produced a favorable impression.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

NEW YORK, June 4

A Limerick despatch says the Government, by proclamation, has taken the first determined step in dealing with the disturbances in Ireland. The real meaning of the action is that the troops and police can fire on the people without incurring any responsibility. It now remains to be seen how the Government will act after giving warning of what they intend to do. The proclamation is posted upon prominent buildings in the County Limerick and elsewhere, in the usual terms.

LONDON, June 5.

A mass meeting in Hyde Park, to protest against the Government's policy with regard to Ireland, was held to-day. Although there was a steady drizzle of rain during the day, large numbers of Irish men and women were present, but the attendance of general public limited. The following resolutions were carried unanimously: That the Government is criminally responsible for the deplorable condition of Ireland; that the meeting summon the Government immediately to suspend evictions and liberate prisoners arrested on suspicion; that Foster resign his office for which he has proved his utter incapacity.

At the Land League meeting in Swords, County Dublin, to-day, the brother of Mr. Kettle presided and Sexton made an address. Steamer Faraday has arrived at Penzance. Over 900 miles of the new telegraph have been laid.

LONDON, June 6.

A despatch from New Pallas to the Standard states that in a disturbance at Bally Brophy, on Sunday, one man was shot dead and others were wounded by a ballist who, with his three sons, has been arrested.

The Standard's despatch from Dublin says that all troops stationed in that city will be confined to their barracks to-day. The same despatch says the riot in Cork, on Friday night, the gravity of which has been exaggerated by previous reports, was not of political character.

The Daily News says that troops in Ireland will, by the end of this week, consist of 30,000 men - 7 regiments cavalry, 11 batteries of artillery and 25 battalions of infantry.

PORTSMOUTH, June 5

A company of the army service corps has been sent to Ireland to be attached to various flying columns.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

ATHENS, June 5.

The Minister of War has ordered a force of 7,000 men to be in readiness to take possession of the ceded district.

LONDON, June 5.

The Standard's Vienna and Berlin correspondents state that a conspiracy against the life of the Czar has been discovered in St. Petersburg. Twenty-one arrests were made.

The Tenant Rights League.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR, - The worthy editor of the Journal, in the issue of the 2nd inst., wishes apparently to treat the meeting of Tenants in this city as a farce; and to support him in his assumption he takes the ground that, had such meeting been held, the names of certain officers should have been mentioned in and appended to the report of the same. The name, "Tenant Rights League," is sufficient for our purpose. We are united for a special purpose, and have availed ourselves of the right of free-born men and departed from the usual course. We will support our City Council in all measures most beneficial to the majority of the citizens. We are non-political. Our League is composed of Catholics, and Protestants of all denominations, and men of all political shades. Their religious, political and social freedom is not in any way tampered with. We are not in Russia. We have no great Czars, but many lesser ones, in the shape of greedy and unjust landlords, who have raised the value and improved their property at the expense of the Tenants. A meeting may be large and respectable and still not public. Surely a body of respectable men can meet together and discuss necessary reforms in civic government, and pass resolutions for future action and for protection, without having to suffer the presence of individuals who cannot behave themselves even in a church. The great majority of working men tenants are employed by the landlords of the city, and should it become known that they were connected with our league, would undoubtedly be cast asid, and help to swell the exodus that the Journal so much deprecates. We are on the defensive. We have not been the aggressor. We do not pine for notoriety. We do not employ men to canvass for members. We make no agitating appeals through the press for supporters. But having the courage of our conviction, will make our power felt in combating the notorious platform laid down by a certain association calling itself the Civic Protection Association. References thereunto will convince the editor of the Journal that if we are not in a proclaimed district of Ireland, we are nearly as bad - when men openly threaten the members of our Legislature, and band themselves together for the purpose of evading a just law. Men who do this would have little mercy on the poor unfortunate tenant if circumstances would place him in their power; and we have not forgotten the fate of the straw man that was captured during the Tenant League. Our motto is: "No taxes to protect other people's property, and pay for what we receive."
