Madame Grundy Always Seeks Such Situations

Dear Mary Haworth: I have a guest house of moderate size on the Jersey coast, with accommodations for 25 paying guests, plus my family of three.

Last week a very fine young matron asked for a summer reservation for an uncle and aunt, now in Florida. I was told they are in their late 70s and want a room no higher than the second floor.

Assuming they were a married couple, I showed accommodations accordingly, and of the two rooms available, the niece chose the one with twin beds, hot and cold running water, and a folding screen for additional privacy, in matters of personal hygiene. There is a bathroom close by.

NIECE MADE LEASE
It was then she told me the uncle and aunt are brother and sister! When I suggested separate rooms on the third floor, she showed no interest; and asked if I thought it was wrong for them to share a room. I said in view of their age it seemed all right to me; and she felt the same.

When she telephoned the uncle and aunt about the accommodations, they seemed agreeable and sent a deposit. But it seems the aunt said something to the effect that she "wouldn't want to give the guest house a bad reputation."

Since talking a second time with the niece I am wondering if the arrangement is entirely out of place; or within proper bounds. They would be here about 11 weeks. I have a feeling that the cost of two rooms was a sort of deterrent. Thank you for advising me. R.Y.

FIRST REACTION
Dear R.Y.: Your own spontaneous shock reaction to the news that an elderly brother and sister were lessees of the second floor room with twin beds, gives the pitch of what other people would feel — if and when the word reached them.

Notice I don't say "what people would think." Because I am sure that most persons, on stopping to think, would agree with the niece, and you and me, that there really is nothing to gasp at or snigger about — if these two in their later 70s were to share a room, for the practical and innocent reasons stated.

That is, because one room is cheaper than two; and because it happens that you have a room to let on your second floor that will accommodate two persons nicely, in arrangements affording each a margin of personal privacy. And because they have to consider costs, and can't manage more than one flight of stairs, in their sunset years.

DOESN'T CANCEL FEELING
However, what people will recognize as the logic of the situation, on second thought, won't alter the Madame Grundy quality of their first consternated emotional response to the discovery that Room 12, let's say, is occupied by Mr. and Miss So-and-so.

Meat Packing Is Stiff Day To Day Competition

With modern, efficient packing plants serving every province and putting their cash on the barrels every day, each of them has to make its money shout loudly enough to attract the necessary supplies of livestock to its own plant.

If competition is the lifeblood of Canadian business, the meat packing industry will never need a transfusion. A meat packer, to stay in business, must compete every hour, and keenly, in both buying livestock and selling meats.

As each packer bids daily for livestock he is between two fires. The prices he pays must be high enough to attract sufficient livestock to keep the plant running efficiently. But on the other hand, he must buy in line with current market values if he

is going to sell his products. Livestock and meat prices basically are determined by the decisions of two groups — the producers of livestock and the consumers of meats. In the long run, it is the adjustments in production which farmers and ranchers make in response to current livestock and meat prices which determine the supply of meat, and consequently the prices at retail counters. In short run it is the daily or weekly shopping of housewives all across the country which establishes prices at the livestock markets.

And so it is that the competition for supplies and markets helps keep the prices for meat animals and meats in line with the old law of supply and demand.

TODAY'S TREAT

ISLAND BAKED BEANS
1 pt. beans
1 small onion
1/2 teaspoon mustard
2 teaspoons salt
1 cup water
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/4 pound pork (fat or lean mix ed)
1/2 cup molasses
Method:— Soak beans overnight or parboil. Place in crock and add mustard, salt, pepper, pork, onion, and enough water to cover. Add water as needed. When baked for two hours add molasses. Cook four hours. (Yellow-eyed beans).

BRAN MUFFINS
2 3/4 cups Health Bran
1 1/2 cups flour
1 cup brown sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup raisins
1 egg
2 tablespoons shortening
1 1/2 cups milk
Method:— Cream shortening and sugar; add egg and beat well. Add 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 cup raisins and the 2 3/4 cups Health Bran. Let bran and raisins absorb milk for 3 or 4 minutes, then add flour, baking powder and salt. Stir quickly just to moisten flour. Bake in muffin tins in 375 degree oven for approximately 20 minutes.

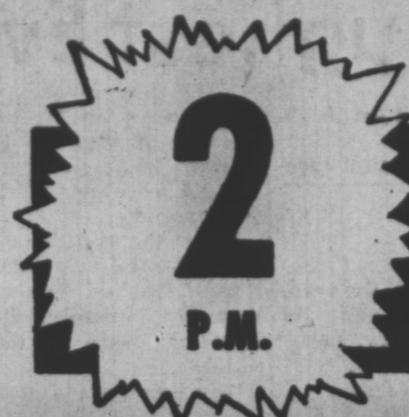
