DEPUTY SHERIFF MCKAY left this morning for Dorchester with the Spaniard Micaldo, who was convicted of stabbing with intent to murder at the last term of the Supreme Court, and sentenced to six years in the penitentiary. JOHN BERRIGAN, JR., East Royalty, accidentally shot himself in the left hand while examining a loaded revolver yesterday. The bullet entered the palm of the hand and passed clear through. This business of carelessly handling firearms cannot be too severely condemned. POTATOES in the country are now worth from 30 to 35 cents a bushel. At the time of the election the price was much lower. Grits blamed the Government for the low price. They will not be so ready now, of course, to credit the Government with the high price. But it is a poor rule that won't work both ways. CAPT. KEMBERLY, Cadet Ernest Moore, (son of Theo. Moore, of this city) and Cadet Nicholson, (also of this city), all of the Salvation Army, left this morning for St. John under orders for service elsewhere. A large number of their fellow soldiers, including the band, were at the station to see them off and bid them farewell. A SERIOUS landslide is reported near Assamtsungash, above Campbellton, N. B. An engine and six cars of an accommodation train were derailed and five of the cars piled up on the track. The sixth car rolled over the bank into the river, and floated down the stream. The car, which contained a church organ was grounded on an island some distance down the river and across have been sent from Campbellton to take off the organ. MR. T. C. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Crimes Bill. LONDON, May 15. The Crimes Bill has been under discussion during seven sittings in committee. Each day has seen old amendments disposed of and new amendments added. Twenty minor amendments still block the way of a division on Sir William Harcourt's proposal. The bill has already undergone considerable alterations in form, and it is plain it will be greatly changed before being reported back to the House. The Home Rulers have so far fought the measure step by step. It is reported that Gladstone is unwilling to continue merely obstructive a term, and is endeavoring to come to terms with the Government by restricting the opposition to really important points in return for concessions. The Freshets. ST. JOHN, N. B., May 15. From all parts of the Province affected by the high freshets the report is received that the water is rapidly falling. On the line of the New Brunswick railway the public will be gratified to learn that the water has fallen to such an extent as to cause no further interruption to travel and that commencing this morning the regular train service will be resumed. At Fredericton the water has fallen 2 1/2 feet. There will be gas to-morrow night and the waterworks engine will be able to start up in a day or two. Prottesting against O'Brien. TORONTO, May 15. About 15,000 people gathered in Queen's Park yesterday at a public meeting, called to protest against Wm. O'Brien's mission to Canada. The meeting was one of the most orderly and enthusiastic ever held in this city. The resolutions were carried unanimously. O'Brien is expected here to-morrow and will lecture in the open air on Tuesday afternoon, his friends having been unable to procure a hall. A serious riot is feared. Pictou Strike Ended. HALIFAX, May 15. The strike of the Pictou coal miners has finally ended in a compromise, the men agreeing to accept a reduction of 6 cents a ton in wide working place and thirteen cents in narrow ones. The miners at Reserve mine, near Sydney, are out on a strike for an increase of three cents a ton, and fears are felt of a general strike at the Cape Breton mines. Turkish Affairs. CONSTANTINOPLE, May 15. Sheikh Abin Houda has been exiled from Turkey for conspiring to dethrone the Sultan. He was for a long time an intimate adviser of the Sultan. Drowning Accident. QUEBEC, May 14. David Lussier and Joseph Lambert, two lumber camp men, were drowned in Chaudiere River, a day or two ago, by the upsetting of a canoe. A Suicide. HALIFAX, May 15. MONDAY, May 16. The Court did not meet Saturday owing to the illness of Judge Peters. This morning, however, the Judge was able to be present, and the case of Griffiths vs. the City of Charlottetown was again taken up, and Mr. Fitzgerald concluded his argument in support of a new trial. Judgment was reserved. Mary McKenzie vs. Malcolm Stewart and wife. Action of slander tried last Hilary term when verdict for \$500 was found for plaintiff. Since then the defendants allege that they have discovered important evidence, which they did not know of last winter, and this afternoon Mr. Fitzgerald on affidavit applied for a new trial on that ground. The Court took time to consider, and in the meantime ordered the Sheriff to delay proceedings on the execution now in his hands. The Court then adjourned until Monday, the 30th May at eleven o'clock when judgments will be delivered.
