

CHARLOTTETOWN SCHOOLS.

The Midsummer Examinations.

Upper Prince Street School.

The closing exercises of this most interesting school were attended by many of the parents of the children and the friends of education in the city. Examinations in the thorough were Dr. Anderson and Dr. Leeming, Mr. James, Principals Miller and McSwain, Mr. Duncan, Mr. E. Stewart, Hon. David Laird, Hon. T. H. Haviland, Hon. D. F. Faulkner, Mr. Long, Mr. Kenney, Mr. Blanchard, Mr. H. Anderson, Mr. D. A. Bruce, Mr. George Peake, besides a large number of ladies. At the close, the upper hall of the school was greatly overflowed by the school president, with His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor at his right hand.

The chairman, in the course of a short address, referred to the excellence of the school, and the high standard of the good service done by the teachers, and set forth the exceedingly small cost to the city (less than \$7 per pupil, on the average) of the gratifying results obtained in the public schools of Charlottetown. He then distributed the certificates of the School Board, after which Lieutenant-Governor Howland presented his medal for the best essay upon Canada and its resources to Miss Anderson, daughter of H. Anderson, Esq., of the P. E. I. Railway, and Hon. T. H. Haviland presented his prize for history to the same young lady.

THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY.

The following memorial speaks for itself:

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir John Campbell Hamilton Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen, &c., &c., Governor General of Canada, in Council:

The memorial of the undersigned, being residents of Queen's County, in the Province of Prince Edward Island, hereby sheweth:

That a large section of the said Province comprising the important districts of Belfast and Murray Harbor is without any railway facilities.

That all the said country is settled with prosperous farmers; that the valuable fisheries on the coast are being vigorously prosecuted and that the prosperity of these industries would be promoted by the construction of a railway leading from South-Haven to Murray Harbor, and connecting with the main line of the Prince Edward Island Railway at some point at or near Perth station, and touching at or near Montague Bridge, an important and flourishing shipping port, and which has no railway communication.

Your memorialists would also respectfully urge that a branch railway be built from a point at or near Royal Junction, in Queen's County, to North Covehead, or near Covehead, a distance of about eight miles. This short branch would connect the flourishing farming district of the North Coast of the Province, the valuable fisheries now carried on at Rustico and Covehead, and the very attractive summer resorts on the shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, with the City of Charlottetown.

Your memorialists are strongly of opinion that if these branches were constructed they would not only prove self-sustaining, but would materially assist in removing the loss in the working of the Prince Edward Island Railway.

Your memorialists strongly support the contention of certain members of the Senate and Commons for Prince Edward Island, as set forth in a memorial presented by them to Your Excellency a short time ago, regarding the claims of Prince Edward Island to a fair participation in the expenditures of Canada for the construction of public works, and earnestly pray Your Excellency to take the premises into your favorable consideration and recommendation to Parliament, that authority be given for the construction of the branch Railways herein referred to.

And your memorialists, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
