450 Donors Needed Today At Final Blood Donor Clinics

Attendance at yesterday's sessions of the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic being held at The Clover Club showed some improvement yesterday when 111 registered in the afternoon and another 214 in the evening. This brings Charlottetown's total to date up to 711, and the local Blood Donor Committee headed by Mr. F. A. S. Jones stated last night that the 450 donors needed today to meet the quota can easily be handled if 225 will report this afternoon and another 225 this evening. There should be no difficulty in securing this number from the city and surrounding districts. Again yesterday there were several donors in attendance from distant parts of the province.

Mrs. Hurst Is Guest Speaker At Guild Meeting

Mrs. R. R. Hurst, Provincial President for the Presbyterian W.M.S., was the recent guest speaker at a meeting of the Guild of St. Andrew.

Mrs. Hurst outlined geographically the work of Canadian Missions at home and abroad. 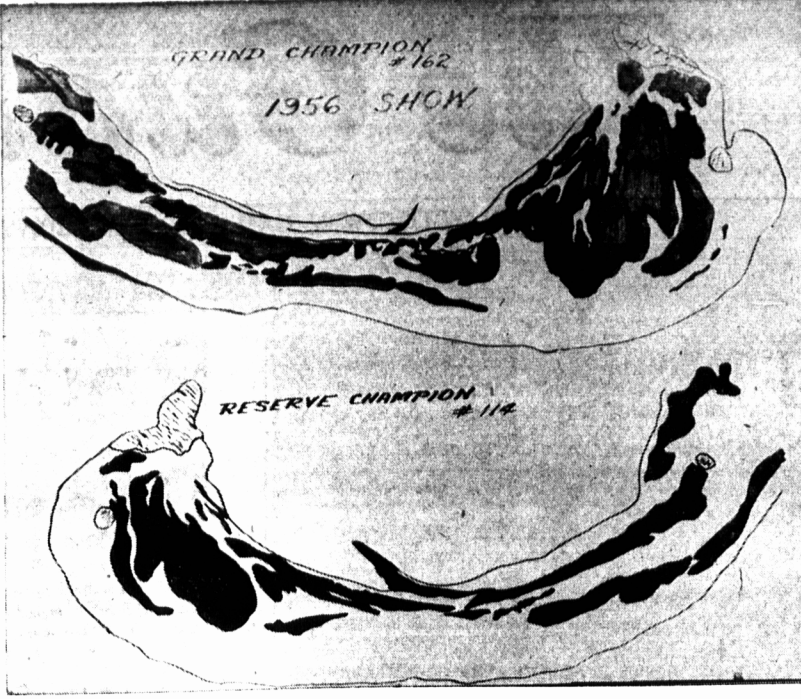

Hot Debate On Pipeline Plans

OTTAWA, (CP)—A rapid-fire exchange of questions and answers on the natural gas pipeline occurred for the second straight day between cabinet ministers and opposition members in the Commons Wednesday. The exchange was often heated.

The cabinet remained mum on press reports that the federal government will make a short-term loan of some \$80,000,000 to Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd. to enable a start on the prairie leg of the Alberta-to-Montreal line this year.

And Trade Minister Howe indicated he has received a letter from Frank McMahon, Calgary gas executive. Mr. Howe refused to say what the letter contained.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS

PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND CLOSING OF ROADS

The following Regulations are made this 1st day of May, 1956, by the Minister of Highways, under Sub-section (c) of Section 51 of the Highways Act, 1956

1. In these Regulations—

REGULATIONS

(a) "Heavy Traffic" means a motor vehicle having a gross weight, with load, in excess of 6,000 pounds.

(b) "Light Pavement" means those roads in the Province which have been paved with light pavement, and includes the following roads:

- Tignish to Montrose Bridge
- Alberton to Alberton Wharf
- O'Leary to Bethel
- Tyne Valley & Vicinity
- Day's Corner to Wellington and Vicinity
- St. Eleanors, North (approx. 3/4 mile)
- St. Eleanors, East (approx. 3/4 mile)
- Crapaud (T.C.H.) to Victoria
- Queens Arms to Douses Bridge
- Parkdale and Spring Park Streets
- Belvedere Corner to Falconwood
- Belvedere Corner to Mount Edward Road
- Mount Edward Road
- Charlottetown Airport Northwards
- York Road, Northwards from St. Peters Road
- Hillsboro Bridge to Mermaid
- Corran Ban Bridge to National Park
- Saint Andrews to Savage Harbour
- Morell Streets
- St. Peters-North Side Road (approx. 3/4 mile)
- Souris to Red Point
- Millview to Pinette
- Montague to Lower Montague and Vicinity
- Montague to Murray River and Murray Harbour
- Seven Mile Road - Gardigan to Dundas Corner

(c) "Newspaper Publication" means publication in some newspaper published in the Province.

(d) "Pavement" means roads in the Province which have been paved.

(e) "Public Notice" means notice to the public given by or on behalf of the Minister, either by newspaper publication or by radio announcement, to the effect that roads are closed to traffic as mentioned therein, or that such restrictions have been removed.

(f) "Radio Announcement" means announcement, over a radio broadcasting station within the Province.

(g) "Traffic" means motor vehicle traffic.

2. Roads, pavement and light pavement shall be closed to heavy traffic, or to all traffic, from midnight of the day when public notice of such closing is first given, removing such restrictions.

3. Any such public notice may advertise or announce the closing to traffic only, or to heavy traffic only, of light pavement only, or of all pavement, or of all roads in the Province.

4. A radio announcement may announce a public notice on Sunday or a holiday.

5. The members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and other Peace Officers in the Province shall enforce these Regulations.

6. In prosecution for offences against these Regulations, the production of:

(a) A copy of a newspaper containing a public notice; or

(b) An affidavit by the Manager or person in charge of a radio broadcasting station that a public notice has been announced over such station, stating the date of radio announcement, and the words used therein; shall be conclusive evidence of the contents of any public notice and of the date and fact of its newspaper publication or radio announcement.
