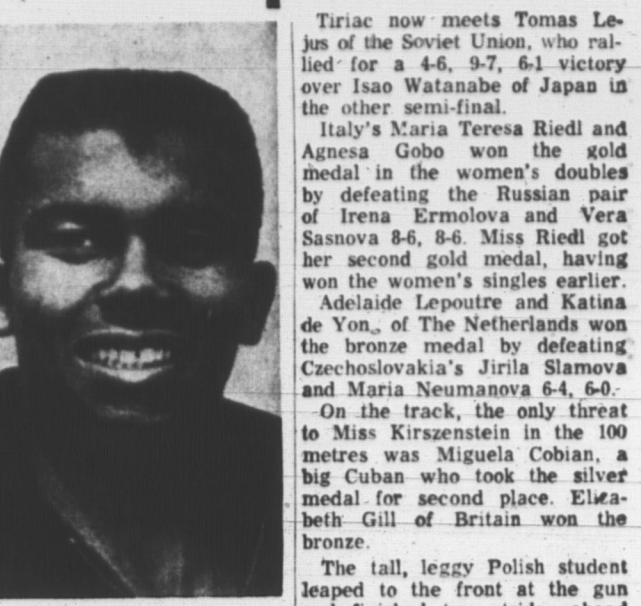
HUNTER'S CORNER

Vancouver's Harry Jerome Suffers Defeat In Sprint

From AP-Reuters BUDAPEST (CP) - Hideo Iijima of Japan upset two favored North American sprinters Thursday in winning the 100 metres at the World Student Games here in a sizzling 10.1 seconds. George Anderson of the United States was second and Harry Jerome of Vancouver, co-holder of the world record of 10 seconds flat, was third.

Jerome's bronze was Canada's first medal at the games. Canadians are participating for the first time. It was an exciting race: Iijima shot to the front at the gun and withstood a powerful spurt by Anderson just before hitting the tape.

Two-tenths of a second blanketed the first six finishers in the eight-man final. Anderson was clocked in the same time as Iijima. Jerome was timed in 10.2 and the three men behind him were at 10.3. They were Wieslaw Maniak of Poland and Fritz Obersiebrasse and Jurgen Feisen, both of West Germany.

CROTHERS WINS EASILY Canada's other world-class track man here, Bill Crothers, qualified easily for the 800 metres final, winning his semi-final heat in one minute, 51.4 seconds. Crothers' time, on a damp track in cold, numbing weather, was much slower than his best of 1:45.6, recorded at the Tokyo Olympics last year when he finished second to New Zealand's Peter Snell.

The bespectacled Markham, Ont., pharmacist won his semi-final race ahead of Austria's Rudolf Klaban, George Germann, the chief U.S. threat in this event here, and Michel Samper of France.

Two tall, husky Polish women won gold medals in track and field, one expected, the other unexpected. The fabulous Irena Kirszenstein, the world's fastest woman, zoomed down the track in 11.3 seconds, one-fifth of a second off her best time, to take the 100 metres.

IRENA PRESS OUT Teammate Danuta Straczynska won the 80-metre hurdles in 10.6, while the favorite, Irena Press of the Soviet Union, watched from the stands. Miss Press pulled a muscle in her right thigh in the qualifying heats. Behind Crothers, Klaban clocked 1:51.7 and Samper the same time. All three qualified for the final with the Canadian ace.

Four European runners were eliminated in the eight-man field. In the other 800 metres semi-final, Didier Gustin of France barely nosed out Britain's John Boulter at the tape. Gustin's time was 1:51.5. Boulter clocked 1:51.6.

Third and fourth, and last to qualify in the eight-man field, were Jan Kasal of Czechoslovakia in 1:51.7 and Karl Olofsson of Sweden in 1:51.8. The following is today's draw: 10:30 a.m. - B. MacKinnon vs B. Stull.

We advertise for the benefit of our tourists, the joys of trout fishing in this fair province and yet, more trout are killed and allowed to rot in our streams because some potato grower takes the easy way out to wash a sprayer than an army of trout fisherman could take with rod and line in a whole season. Our local black ducks have had the course and, unless drastic Government is implemented many of our former top trout streams will be as barren of trout as the Sahara Desert.

Triac now meets Tomas Lejus of the Soviet Union, who rallied for a 4-6, 9-7, 6-1 victory over Iso Watanabe of Japan in the second semi-final. Italy's Maria Teresa Riedl and Agnesa Gobo won the gold medal in the women's doubles by defeating the Russian pair of Irena Ermolova and Vera Sasnova 6-4, 6-4. Miss Riedl got her second gold medal, having won the women's singles earlier. Adelaide Lepoutre and Katina de Von, of The Netherlands won the bronze medal by defeating Czechoslovakia's Jirila Slamova and Maria Neumanova 6-4, 6-0.

On the track, the only threat to Miss Kirszenstein in the 100 metres was Miguela Cobian, a big Cuban who took the silver medal for second place. Elizabeth Gill of Britain won the bronze. The tall, leggy Polish student leaped to the front at the gun and finished two strides ahead of the hard-running Cuban. The small crowd gave her a tremendous ovation.

She established herself as the world's fastest woman by equalling the 100-metre record of 11.1 a month ago and later setting a world mark of 22.7 for the 200 metres. In the 80-metre hurdles, Miss Straczynska led most of the way and hit the tape just ahead of Snejana Kerkova of Bulgaria. Miss Kerkova was timed in 10.8. Tatiana Antarian of Russia was third in 10.9.

Young McQuaid Scores Upset

Bill Blanchard defeated Jim McQuaid 6-2, 6-4 in the city closed tennis tournament at the Charlottetown courts yesterday. Jim Cullen advanced to the quarter finals in the open division by ousting B. Blanchard 6-0, 6-4.

Veteran campaigner Walter Cullen defeated Reg 'Bud' McAleer in a hard fought match which featured long rallies. McAleer took the first set 6-2 in the best of three match with Cullen coming back to square the second, winning the second set 7-5. Cullen took the deciding set by 6-3 count.

In the only doubles match played to date B. Comerford and L. Huggan topped M. Duffy and J. McQuaid 6-2, 6-1. In the boys 18 and under division Jim McQuaid pulled an upset by defeating Mike Duffy in a hard fought match. Duffy won the first set 11-9 and lost the next two 7-5 and 6-3 to advance to the finals.

In the open singles veteran Earl Smith topped "Ginger" Breodon 6-1, 6-2.

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
