

Forbie Kennedy Dinner Scheduled For Tonight

[and hockey followers will have a chance to honor Charlottetown's most successful hockey son and the only representative of Prince Edward Island in the National Hockey League at the Charlottetown branch of the Royal Canadian Legion tonight.
Forbie Kennedy of the Boston Bruins returned recently to the Garden of the Gulf when a broken collar bone suffered in a game against the Montreal Canadiens sidelined the stocky blocker for the remainder of the season. He will make his residence in Charlottetown until it is time to return to the hockey wars.
A group of sports minded gentlemen met at a local restaurant a couple of weeks ago and decided they would like to see something done in the way of public recognition of Kennedy's feats in Canada's national game.
These gentlemen elected a committee and went about the

business of planning this testimonial dinner in Forbie's honor which will hold the spotlight on the local sports scene tonight. Members of the committee include: Charles Ryan, Bill Ledwith, George Stewart, Hal Whitlock and Lorne Hennessy.
Forbie was born in Dorchester, N.B. but shortly after his birth the Kennedy family moved to O'Leary, P.E.I. When Forbie was three years of age the family again took up roots and this time they took up residence in Charlottetown, where they are still residing.
CHIT'OWN MINOR PRODUCT
Forbie played his way up through the Charlottetown minor hockey system right from the paperweight ranks through to midget. He was playing with a Charlottetown juvenile team in a series against Bathurst and Newcastle when he was still of midget age. Charlottetown emerged victorious from the series with a 16-9 margin and out of the 16 markers Forbie garnered 11.
He was playing with a Halifax

junior team when Sam Pollock scouted him for the Montreal Canadiens organization. The following year, when he was 17, Forbie attended camp with the Montreal Canadiens junior 'A' club and was an immediate success. He had an illustrious career with the junior Reds. When his junior days had expired the Canadiens sold him to the Chicago Black Hawks and the Charlottetown hockey ace jumped right from junior hockey to the parent Black Hawks. He banged home eight goals and contributed 13 assists in his rookie year in the 'big time'.
The following year Kennedy was traded to the Detroit Red Wings and he fired 11 goals in his first season with the Wings. But the pride of Charlottetown's hockey followers was having trouble seeing eye-to-eye with Jack Adams, who was the boss of the Wings at that time.
The next couple of years in his career found Forbie spending most of his time in the minor pro leagues, but he kept battling and finally got a break when the Wings agreed to let him go to the Boston Bruins and the stocky batter was an immediate hit with the Beantown aggregation and was finally back in hockey's greatest league. He was leading the individual scoring race in the Western Hockey League when the Bruins purchased him. Forbie is primarily a centreman, but has done an adequate job for the Bruins on both wings when injuries forced the management to move him around and last season he was their penalty killer due to his checking and stickhandling ability.
At the time of his injury Kennedy had six goals for the Milt Schmidt coached forces and four of those markers had come while he was killing off a penalty for his club.
This writer feels that this dinner is something that is long overdue for Mr. Kennedy and we will be looking forward to seeing you there. There will be a reception at 7:00 o'clock and the dinner will get underway at 7:30.

SDU Varsity Saints Top Mt. A To Grab The Ch'ship

A stranger to the dressing room would hardly believe that this team had just won a Maritime Championship. There were no wild demonstrations, dips in the showers, or any of the usual antics that mark a post-victory celebration. Members of the faculty and a few students shook hands with the players, while photographers scurried for pictures.
A jubilant Jack Kane expressed his own note of congratulations to the players, saying: "It's your championship and no one can take it away from you."
Premier Walter Shaw entered the dressing room accompanied by the President of St. Dunstan's, Monsignor G.A. Macdonald, who, incidentally, was faculty coach of the 1947 team. "A great team effort," said Mr. Shaw, "and I am very proud of you all. You all played very well, and I hope you can now take the Canadian title. Your team is a credit to the Island."
Vince Mulligan, the veteran of the Saints' club and team captain, speaking with Bill Ledwith on radio, said that he felt it was the hardest fought home game of the season next to the Dalhousie game, which they won 5-3. "But it's a wonderful experience to win the championship — everybody put out — and we'll be able to go all the way."
Coach Jack Kane paid tribute not only to this year's team but also to the players who preceded the present club. "Guys like Billy-Mulligan, Bob Marshall, and Dick Tingley started the winning spirit and it has been with us ever since."
Asked how he felt after winning the championship, as the son of the late Jack Kane, the coach of the first championship team in 1947, he said: "When I look over the coaching job three years ago, it was my ambition to win the Maritime title. During that time I was fortunate enough to get stars like Billy-Mulligan, Vince-Mulligan, Darrell Pollock, and right down the line. Yes, the title brings me a lot of gratification.
But we plan to keep going this year. We've set our sights on a perfect record, and that's what we're after now. Then, of course, we have a couple of games out west.
A four goal outburst in the third period gave St. Dunstan's University Saints a hard earned 6-4 win over a tough Mount Allison club here Saturday afternoon, and with it the Halifax Herald trophy, emblematic of the Maritime Intercollegiate Championship. Undefeated in nine consecutive games, the Saints will now represent the M.I.H.L. at the Canadian finals to be held in Saskatoon March 12-13.
Defending scoring leader Billy MacMillan topped his total to 33 points for the year with three goals, while the Saints' clutch line of Rex MacCarville, Mike Kelly, and Andre Gelinac, contributing four, the extra marker going to Gelinac. George MacMillan also collected a single. Ivan Velan, Dave McLernon, Paul Capelli, and Rick Doyle scored for Mount "A."
For Coach Jack Kane, it was

an ambition fulfilled as he duplicated the feat of his late father, who coached the Saints to their first championship in 1947. Three years ago, taking over a team that was getting nowhere fast, he made St. Dunstan's a hockey power almost overnight.
After finishing fourth in a field of nine in his first season, he led the team to first place last year, but lost the title on a constitutional technicality.
This year the Saints left no doubt as they steam rolled over every team, outscored their opponents 72-31 in nine games, and earned the distinction of being rated the top intercollegiate club in the nation.
But Saturday's game was one of the toughest for the Saints in their long drive to the title. For the first time at home this season, they went into the third period with the score tied.
Ivan Velan, the Mounties sharp-shooter, opened the scoring at 5:47 with SDU defenseman sitting out a boarding infraction. Mike Kelly tied the score at 11:39 on a neat 15 footer with an assist from Rex MacCarville.
Just over a minute later Billy MacMillan scored the first of his three goals at 11:52 with a streaking low shot that beat a Chuck Lawrence from close in. Two minutes later he virtually went through the whole Mount Allison team to net his second.
Chuck Lawrence was particularly brilliant for the Mounties in that first period as he saved on 17 shots, as compared to the two George MacNeil had.
But play evened up somewhat in the second as Mount "A" took to the offensive. Dave McLernon made it 3-3 at the 9:18 mark on a screen shot from 39 feet. Less than a minute later Andre Gelinac deflected in Rex MacCarville's pass from the side of the net to make it 4-2. NEW YORK (AP)—New York Rangers struck for three goals in the first 3 1/2 minutes and held off Toronto behind the brilliant goaltending of Marcel Paille for a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over the Maple Leafs Sunday night.
The loss dropped Toronto four points behind Detroit in the battle for third place. The Red Wings defeated Montreal 5-1. Six Rangers divided the scoring, but it was Paille, with a fantastic performance in the New York cage, who stymied the Leafs after Jean Ratelle, Vic Hadfield, and Bill Hicke had stunted them in the opening minutes.
Paille was credited with 40 saves, six more than Toronto's Johnny Bower. The stocky Ranger goalie made more than half of his saves on point-blank shots and screened drives as the Leafs poured in time and again.
