### Egyptian Armor Pulls Back From Suez Canal

### War Pensioners To Get Boost; Amount Is Not Announced

OTTAWA, Oct. 19 (CP)—The government today announced that it is going to get increased pensions but left them guessing over the size of the hoist. Veterans Minister Lapointe informed the Commons legislation will be introduced at this session of parliament to increase the pension rates, now totalling \$100,000 a year.

George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, tried to determine the amount or character of the increase. Mr. Lapointe said that information will be supplied when the legislation is introduced possibly in a couple of weeks.

#### 20 Per Cent Expected

The increases are expected to be at least 20 per cent, with possibly more than that for the 20,000 war widows drawing pensions. One reason why Mr. Lapointe declined to go into that subject is (Continued on Page 8 Col 6)

### But Egypt Makes New Threats

NICOSIA, Cyprus, Oct. 19 (Reuters)—More British troops are leaving Cyprus tonight by air for the Suez Canal zone area, it was learned.

CAIRO, Oct. 19 (AP)—Egyptian tanks and artillery pulled back toward Cairo today from the bustling British defence perimeter along the Suez canal. But Egypt made a new threat on paper to kick out British soldiers and Moslem extremists demanded "revenge" on British troops.

The canal area was sealed off and placed on a firm British war footing. The British Embassy disclosed Foreign Minister Mohamed Salah Din of Egypt delivered a note of "general protest" against continued presence of British soldiers on Egyptian soil.

The French-language newspaper La Bourse Egyptienne reported Egypt is asking British troops to get out and says if they don't, "Egypt will be obliged to take adequate measures to prevent British military domination of the canal region."

Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, commander in chief of British Middle East land forces, returned to Suez today from London, presumably with orders to hold the canal with the garrisons and reinforcements pouring in.

Three Royal Navy destroyers entered the canal from the south today, en route from the troubled Persian Gulf and headed for the Red Sea.

### Drew Presents Plan To Help Fight Inflation

OTTAWA, Oct. 19 (CP)—George Drew, stating that his Progressive Conservative Party will vote against a C.C.F. request for price controls and subsidies, today placed before the Commons a five-point program aimed at fighting inflation.

1. Reduce the cost of government.
2. Increase production by removing restrictions on production.
3. Launch a real building program that will provide the people of Canada with the homes they need.
4. Carry forward a program for the development of Canada's resources.
5. Adopt such selective controls as are needed to hold down the prices of materials or supplies which the government is setting aside for defence purposes.

Mr. Drew said flexible, selective controls should be applied in cases where prices are affected by the government's buying for defence purposes.

### Thousands Of Londoners Mob Society Wedding

LONDON, Oct. 19 (Reuters)—Politics, high society, romance and pageantry today gave thousands of Londoners the time of their lives at the wedding of the Marquis of Blandford to Susan Hornby.

Princess Margaret was the guest at the wedding of the man Britain once thought she would marry. She attended along with the Queen.

Some women fainted, others wept, as the bride—beautiful and 22—left fashionable St. Margaret's Church.

The couple left the church through an arch of swords held high by a guard of honor formed by members of the Life Guards, Blandford's regiment.

The tall, slim groom, 24, was once Princess Margaret's constant escort at nightclubs and balls. Many predicted they would marry.

Instead, he married a girl from an untitled family whose father directs a chain of book stores. For his best man he took Margaret's latest suitor—Billy Wallace, son of wealthy Mrs. Herbert Agar, wife of the American historian.

The crowd of onlookers outside the church was controlled by police on foot and horseback but it snarled London's traffic across the whole of the city centre.

When the bride arrived, she was scarcely noticed. The crowd had eyes on the guests whose names read like a combined Debrett's Peerage and Who's Who. There were 1,000 of them, including tenants from Blenheim Castle, home of the bridegroom's father, the Duke of Marlborough.

During the ceremony, those watching the Queen thought she looked pale. It was her first public appearance since the King was operated on for lung trouble a month ago.

Queen Mary was among those who attended a lavish wedding reception after the ceremony in the City of London's Goldsmith Hall.

### Only Now Emerging From Tooling Stage

OTTAWA, Oct. 19 (CP)—Production Minister Howe today told the Commons that the government's defence production is being maintained and outlined a program which may result in government defence spending of \$1,500,000,000 during the next 12 months.

In the Throne-Speech debate, Mr. Howe said that in addition, industry has planned to spend \$2,500,000,000 for production of strategic materials in the five-year period, 1950-55.

He said Canada's rearmament effort was just emerging from the tooling stages and in the first six months of the 1951-52 fiscal year, \$112,200,000 worth of defence orders were placed, compared with \$780,000,000 for all last year.

Production figures hitherto secret were disclosed as Mr. Howe, in a 4,500-word statement, defended his program planning against Opposition criticism.

Of a total planned outlay of \$5,000,000,000 for men and materials during a three-year period, the defence program calls for building of \$1,200,000,000 worth of aircraft.

He said 122 Sabre jet fighters have come off production lines and that 72 have been delivered to the R.C.A.F. Future deliveries would depend on the rate of delivery of engines from the United States.

But production of the CF-100 jet fighter, Canada's own creation, was meeting difficulties in getting sufficient component parts. Until these were produced in Canada for the first time, are available in volume quantity production of the CF-100 was "clearly impossible."

Other planes were being produced in Canada, too, as well as ships, guns, ammunition, electronic equipment, trucks, machine tools.

The shipbuilding program in the 1951-53 period would cost between \$130,000,000 and \$200,000,000 and the electronics equipment (Continued on Page 8 Col. 4)

### U. N. To Await Court Decision On Oil Issue

NEW YORK, Oct. 19 (CP)—The United Nations Security Council decided today to drop its debate on the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute until the international Court of Justice can clarify whether the issue is subject to U. N. action.

Iran has challenged the competency of both the International Court and the Security Council on the grounds that the dispute is purely an internal matter. The court now is considering the question of its own competency and the council decided it would be better to wait for a decision since this would have a direct bearing on the council's own position.

### New Road Surface Material May Be Serviceable Here

A new type of road surfacing will be carefully looked over by Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, during the forthcoming trip to attend the annual Good Roads convention in Toronto.

Although little is known here at present about it, the surface has been tested in the Southern United States and is now being tried in Ontario and Quebec. It is believed, too, that a couple of miles of it have been laid in New Brunswick. The surface is said to wear well and may be applied at a far lower cost than the system now in use here.

Mr. MacKinnon was of the opinion that if the surface is practicable—it is designed for clay roads—then application of it here might mean far lower costs than the amount now being spent annually to maintain the present roads. It would also serve to allay the dust nuisance while providing a better surface over which vehicles could pass.

At the same time the Minister pointed out that his Department was not overlooking the possibility of improvements using purely Island materials.

An experiment first tried in the Belfast District, represented by Premier J. Walter Jones, is now being used with success in several other sections of the Province. It involves the use of sandstone shale on the clay roads in low swampy (Continued on Page 5 Col. 7)

### Reds Put Up Stiff Fight For Kumsong

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 20 (Saturday)—(AP)—Allied forces today threw Red defenders of Kumsong off a hill on the Central Korean front. The Communists had taken it during the night in a counter-attack supported by a heavy mortar barrage.

Allied infantrymen were within two miles of the former Red bastion some 30 miles north of parallel 38. The Red hub is under heavy Allied artillery fire.

Chinese attacked desperately last night, a pooled dispatch from the central front said. One gained ground but the Chinese were unable to hold it.

Horsemeat Goes On Sale in Hamilton

HAMILTON, Oct. 19 (CP)—Horsemeat went on sale in Hamilton today. The manager of B. and G. Meats, Limited, said two large quarters sold quickly and clerks couldn't keep up with the demand. Prices vary from 65 cents a pound for tenderloin to 37 cents for stewing meat.

### Senator Says Fishing Industry Is Forgotten

OTTAWA, Oct. 18 (CP)—Senator Ray Fettes (L.-Newfoundland) said today that Canada's concern for her vast fishing industry seems to be overshadowed by an attention to agriculture. Something should be done about it, he added.

The pattern of Western commerce was geared to wheat, he told the Senate in an Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. But what wheat is to the Prairie Provinces "so fish is to Newfoundland."

### Still No Sign Of Missing Plane

WESTOVER AIR FORCE BASE, Mass., 19 (AP)—Canadian and United States planes zigzagged across wide stretches of the Atlantic today but failed to turn up any new hope in the five-day search for 11 airmen lost with a big stratofreighter on a flight from the Azores.

"We'll keep plugging as long as there's any hope," a Westover spokesman said.

The most recent sign of hope, a report of flares in the area last night, turned out to be flares from fishing vessels, the air force said.
