## Annual P.E. Island WI Convention Over

The 53rd annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes ended yesterday afternoon with a tea at Montague Hall. On the agenda for the business meeting were discussions of the reports on agriculture, education and home economics and a report from Mrs. L. G. Ramsay, the Island delegate to a recent convention in Dublin, Ireland, of the Associated Country Women of the World with which the WI is affiliated. The convention adopted resolutions asking for storekeepers to put diabetic food on sale occasionally, for control of contamination of streams and ponds; for soft drink companies to use glass bottles as before rather than the no-return type; for the Provincial Government to support measures already underway to rehabilitate alcoholics; curtailment of Sunday sports where admission is charged. Other resolutions adopted were: one requesting life guards

at provincial parks; for the government to sponsor summer clinics where dental services for students could be supplied, to change the Infants Act so that mothers would have equal rights with the father in regard to custody of their children. The convention has asked for the second time to have this brought before the Legislature. Ralph E. ## Communique Discusses Soviet Visit

OTTAWA (CP) — Frank discussions have been held about further development of Soviet-Canadian relations and it has been agreed that contacts between the two countries through parliamentary channels should be continued.

This was reported Tuesday in a joint Soviet-Canadian communique on the visit to Canada of the delegation of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet, led by Deputy Premier Dmitri Polyansky.

Agriculture was the main interest of the 11-member group, which arrived in Canada June 26 and ended its four-day visit in Toronto.

The 650-word communique, largely couched in official language which traced the itinerary of the Russian group, included the following paragraphs: "The Soviet and Canadian representatives expressed their respective views on certain urgent international problems, say:

including the serious situation in Viet Nam, disarmament, non-proliferation of nuclear weapons and the easing of international tensions.

TO VISIT RUSSIA  
It went on to say that Speaker Lucien Lamoureux of the House of Commons and Speaker Sidney J. Smith of the Senate accepted an invitation from the delegation to visit Russia at their convenience as guests of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet.

The communique said the parliamentarians of the two countries noted the increase in Canada-Soviet trade during the last few years.

"They recognized the problem of the imbalance in this trade and favored further discussion on the subject.

"They considered that the establishment of a direct passenger liner service between Leningrad and Montreal and the participation of the U.S.S.R. in Expo 67 will promote the development of commercial and economic relations between the U.S.S.R. and Canada and will improve mutual understanding."
