W. Chester S. McLeure and J. Angus MacLean, Progressive Conservative members for Queen's will press more urgently than before claims of their dual riding for a more equitable share in federal works.

In their arguments, they will be able to point out that just last week a contract for \$8,000,000 for completion of the government printing bureau in Hull. (Represented in the Commons by Public Works Minister Fournier) was sanctioned by the cabinet. In Ottawa the statistics building has just completed at a cost of more than \$7,000,000, and the veteran's building a short distance west of Parliament Hill, is being rushed to completion. This structure estimated to cost \$8,000,000. All these building require large quantities of steel, but from the speed of construction this week and last month, it appears that the former bottleneck in steel is broken. If the Queen's members strike while the iron is hot, bulldozers and power shovels may be backing out the foundation for Charlottetown's new Federal building as soon as the snow melts in the spring of 1953.

Summerside \$200,000 Bond Issue Sold

An issue of the Town of Summerside bonds for \$200,000 has been sold to Dominion Securities and the Provincial Bank of Canada who were the highest bidders at \$100.03. Tenders for this bond issue closed at four o'clock on Friday. They were five per cent serial bonds maturing in 20 years.

Other bids were: Bank of Nova Scotia syndicate, \$99.29, Eastern Securities and the Royal Bank \$98.81, Nesbit Thompson Co. and the Canadian Bank of Commerce \$98.07.—S

Report Heavy Yield of Potatoes In Prince County

Farmers in Prince County are presently completing the harvesting of a record crop of potatoes not only in bushels per acre, which is reported to be as high as 500, but also of an unusually large size. The Guardian office at Alberton has a window display of five potatoes with a combined weight of thirteen and three quarter pounds.

The largest of these is a Keawick weighing three and a half pounds brought in by Heber Hardy and grown at Middleton. The second largest, a perfectly formed Green Mountain, was grown by J. H. MacFarlane of Beque and weighs three pounds. Two others are Sebegos each weighing two and a half, one grown on the farm of Joseph O'Rourke and the second by Arnold Hardy, both of Alberton. Reports of even larger potatoes have been received and even larger ones may turn up when grading commences.

The South Shore Musical Festival which is to be held in the Summerside High School auditorium this Friday and Saturday is growing with leaps and bounds. From a very modest beginning a few years ago, the entries have increased to such an extent that it is becoming difficult to accommodate the large number of children who aspire to supremacy in the music and elocution classes.

Those who were privileged to attend the festival last year are of the opinion that the quality of the presentations are keeping pace with the quantity. The improvement was easily discernible at last year's show. The young entrants are apparently getting more and better coaching in the fundamentals of their art.

With such large classes, the competition is bound to get keener, and to come out on top a student must give a lot of time to the preparation of his or her recital. The officials of the South Shore Musical are to be congratulated on their energy and enthusiasm, which has resulted in a corresponding energy and enthusiasm on the part of those who compete.
