

### Ten-Month Jail Term Drawn On Intent To Wound Charge

SUMMERSIDE—A Summerside man, Harold Joseph Martin, drew a 10-month sentence in Prince County Jail when he pleaded guilty to a charge of intent to wound causing bodily harm in County Court Judge's Criminal Court yesterday.

The charge was the result of a shooting in the Martin home Nov. 7 when Martin shot his wife, Joyce Martin, and a visitor Daniel Nault. Nault has since returned to his home in Western Canada.

In a moving plea for clemency defence counsel J.O.C. Campbell Q.C. told the court Martin was a war veteran with a physical disability suffered during the war. Since his father's death Martin has helped support his mother.

Mr. Campbell told the court Martin's wife is now pregnant and she will need her husband's assistance in raising the child.

Martin discharged a gun in the general direction of his wife and her paramour, said Mr. Campbell, "but who wouldn't have do so?" he asked. "It's a pity he didn't kill him, no jury would ever find him guilty."

The defence counsel contended Martin had pleaded guilty to defend his wife's reputation.

Crown Prosecutor D.O. Stewart, Q.C., told the court the Crown would not ask for a heavy sentence because Martin and his wife have made a reconciliation and he felt the accused had learned a pretty severe lesson.

In handing down sentence Judge W. E. Darby said he was taking into consideration the fact that the accused had pleaded guilty saving much expense and perhaps an unsavoury trial and the fact that Martin and his wife were now reconciled. He added he was showing further mercy by including the six months Martin has already served in the sentence.

J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C., and George MacMahon were defence counsel.

### Integration Is Advocated

The integration of vocational training into Prince Edward Island's education system was advocated by Wilson Ross, supervisor of schools Thursday night.

Mr. Ross was guest speaker at the formal closing of night classes at the Vocational School, School principal E. D. MacPhail, presided.

The change, Mr. Ross contended, would bring P.E.I. into line with other provinces. In these provinces having vocational highschools, he said, it is possible for students to forego academic courses such as Latin or French and take up vocational training such as carpentry and still receive credits for high school certificates.

The function was held in the agricultural hall of the Vocational School and mark the discontinuance for this year of the following night classes: drafting, welding, mechanics, plumbing, sheet metal, electricity, carpentry, typing, bookkeeping and shorthand as well as a course in English.

### Rail Grading Termed Best For Higher Quality, Profits

Rail grading of lambs seems to be more profitable to lamb producers of the province according to opinions expressed yesterday at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Sheep Breeders' Association in Charlottetown yesterday.

It was also felt that rail grading would have the effect of improving the quality of the product in a manner similar to that experienced in the hog industry.

Veteran breeders such as Alexander Hamilton of New Perth, Hudson Pridham of Montrose, V. E. McLellan, Alma and John Wallace, Alma, all agreed that rail grading had invariably given higher returns to the breeder.

**RESOLUTION PASSED**

A resolution recommending that breeders ship their lambs on a rail grade basis rather than on a live weight basis was unanimously adopted at the meeting chaired by Rudson Pridham who was re-elected president of the organization.

In his report to the meeting Mr. Pridham said there had been 21,000 pounds of wool marketed through the Producers Co-op who acted as agents for the association. He noted that this was a considerable increase over the previous year.

The price he said with the addition of the 28 cents government subsidy realized 60 cents per pound for the grower. He said the quality of lambs was up with 86 per cent of the lambs grading A or B compared to 79 per cent, the previous year.

He expressed the opinion that better pasture and better husbandry methods were responsible for this improvement. He said the demand for pure bred rams was good during the year.

**WANTS LEADERSHIP**

Mr. McLellan felt there should be more leadership given from federal and provincial fieldmen. He thought it a shame that breeders were receiving only 36 cents for good lambs. "You could get that for the poorest cull around the place," he added.

Mr. MacLellan felt that the revival of the club system would do much to assist farmers in the marketing of lambs. He felt that under present conditions, the breeders were required to accept whatever price was being offered. A co-operative effort would give them the chance to deal with a number of different outlets and obtain the best price available.

He recalled that some years ago when farmers were not satisfied with the price being offered locally, they shipped to the open market in Montreal and realized a much higher price. He thought fieldmen could do much to educate farmers along this line.

The little girl had been ill for about a week with rheumatic fever but her condition had not been considered serious. She was taken to the Prince County Hospital Thursday when her condition worsened and she died early Friday morning.

Mr. Clow is the manager of the Guardian-Patriot Office in Summerside.

In addition to her parents the child is survived by four sisters and two brothers, ranging in age from eight to 17 years. They are Carol, Mary, Constance, Elsie, Ronald and Terrence.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon with service at St. Paul's Church. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

### Community Hospital Finances Show Improvement Over '57

O'LEARY — The annual meeting of Community Hospital, O'Leary, was held Wednesday evening in the public hall with the president, Errol Stetson, presiding. Recording secretary was Mrs. Thiren Ellis.

The financial report for the year 1958, was given by the treasurer, Douglas Adams and showed some improvement in the financial situation from the previous year.

Accounts receivable from patients amounted to \$22,876.59; total assets of the hospital \$143,704.93 with liabilities in accounts and notes payable of \$37,425.78; the operating account showed a small credit balance after provision for doubtful accounts.

The Ladies Aid presented a fine report which showed over \$2,000 contributed toward the work of the hospital during the past year.

Dr. L. G. Dewar gave the report of the medical staff. Over 800 patients were admitted in the year. 130 babies born and 200 operations performed. Dr. Dewar paid tribute to the nursing and hospital staff.

Dr. Charles Dewar gave a report of a proposed extension to the present nurses home which would provide needed space and recommended implementation of the Agnew report.

Douglas Adams, Edwin Turner and Alton Raynor were re-elected for a fourth year term on the board of trustees. A vote of thanks was extended the Ladies Aid by Douglas Adams.

A trustees meeting was then held and the following officers appointed: Errol Stetson, president; re-elected; Bernard Shea, vice-president; Edwin Turner, secretary; re-elected; Douglas Adams, treasurer, re-elected.

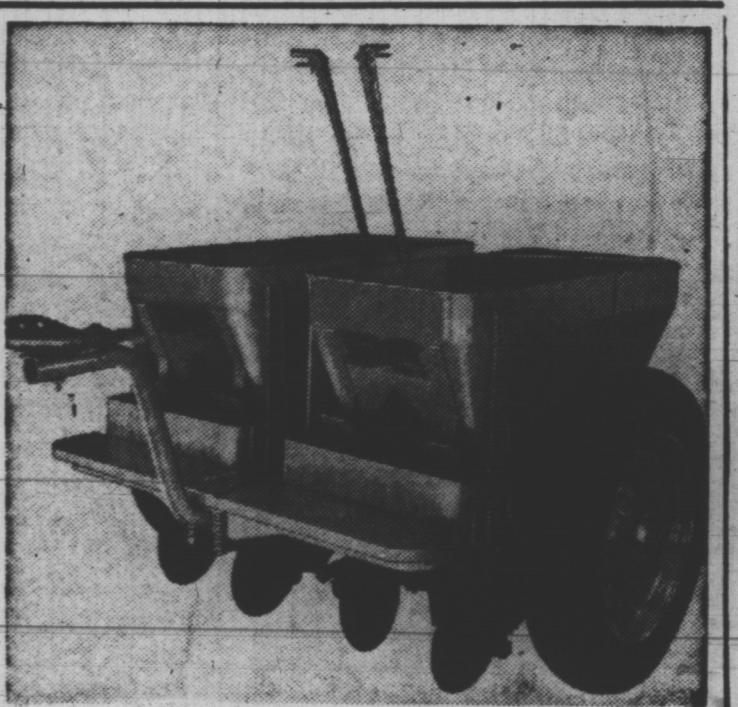
