In point of fact the Government have ordered the expenditure account of last year to be kept open until the 15th inst., in order that, as far as possible, all expenditures of last year may be included in last year's accounts. Perhaps the *Patriot* will, as in duty bound, make a correction, and apologise to its readers for misleading them in this respect.

TO-DAY a large concourse of citizen's testified their respect for the late Mr. Bernard McCarey by following his remains to their final resting place. He was well worthy of this, the last token of respect and affection, which one man can give to another, or which a whole community can express towards a good and honest man. Captain McCarey was, for nearly forty years, connected with steamboat enterprises. He commanded the "Heather Belle" for a long time, and won the confidence of the public and his employers by his uniform courtesy and excellent character. During his illness he had the sympathy of every one, and on the occasion of his death he passed away universally esteemed and regretted.

ELSEWHERE will be found Mayor Dawson's report for the year just closed. The other business transacted at the City Council last evening was the adoption of a report from the Committee appointed to scrutinize the list of delinquent City taxpayers. It states that 75 per cent. of the taxes written off could have been collected had the Collector attended to his duty. Besides this a resolution was carried to the effect that His Worship the Mayor be requested to call a public meeting of the rate-payers to discuss the water question, the present financial state of the City, and the proposed rate of assessment on real estate for the coming year.

Irish National Land League.

The regular meeting of this organization was held in St. Patrick's Hall last evening. It was one of the largest meetings of the League. Several ladies favored the occasion with their presence. The usual routine business was disposed of, and a number of new names were added to the membership.

A letter was read from the Secretary, reporting the formation of a Branch of the Land League, named the "Parnell Branch, St. Cuthbert's Parish," near Baldwin Station, with every prospect of success.

It was resolved that the following letter, received by the Treasurer of the League from the late Hon. Col. McGill, the day previous to his death, be published:—

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., 5th January, 1882.

Philip Coyle, Esq.

MY DEAR SIR,—Herewith enclosed you will find five dollars, being a small donation towards the fund for the relief of the distressed and evicted tenants of Ireland, whose deplorable condition, in common with the Highland crofters of Scotland, is such as ought to command the sympathy of every generous heart.

I am, respectfully yours, Wm. McGill.

On the introduction of resolutions of condolence for the late lamented Vice-President of this League, Messrs. P. D. Cox, John Kelly and P. R. Bowers paid a graceful tribute to the generous nature of the deceased gentleman. Mr. Bowers especially dealt with the life and labors of Col. McGill, and referred to the deep interest he manifested on all occasions for the welfare of the people, and to his charitable disposition, which was always ready to relieve distress.

P. D. Cox, Esq., was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Mr. McGill; and John Kelly, Esq., was elected Assistant Vice-President.

The President introduced to the meeting Mr. James Davis, who was prevented, on account of the weather, from addressing our last meeting. Mr. Davis—who is himself an Englishman by birth—occupied the platform for over an hour. His subject was the "Cause of Ireland." It would be impossible in a short report to do justice to Mr. Davis' really fine address. The blundering policy of British statesmen in regard to Ireland—and especially that of Mr. Gladstone, of whom the lecturer had a personal knowledge—was described in no gentle terms. The lecture abounded in passages of rare eloquence, and was delivered in a manner which entitles Mr. Davis to rank amongst our best public speakers. The applause was both loud and frequent, and the audience felt convinced that the "Cause of Ireland" had a worthy and able advocate in the person of Mr. Davis.

Councillor Byrne spoke in complimentary terms of the address, and believed that if Mr. Davis was now in Ireland he would be deemed worthy of a place in Kilmalham. Mr. Byrne felt certain that the present year is pregnant with great events for the welfare of Ireland, as just a hundred years ago Henry Grattan secured for her the boon of Legislative Independence.

P. R. Bowers, Esq., also bestowed the highest praise on Mr. Davis' effort. Other gentlemen endorsed the sentiments of the previous speakers, when the thanks of the meeting were tendered Mr. Davis, to which he warmly replied.

The President, in a few closing remarks, regretted the fact that there were yet some Irishmen, and Irishmen's sons, in this city who were not members of the League, and could not see a reason why this was so.

Meeting adjourned.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same," I do hereby give Public Notice that an

Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councillor in the City Council for each Ward of said City,

Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on

WEDNESDAY,

the 25th Day of January, A. D. 1882,

At the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearty's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets.

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Burchester Street, and the part of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground.

Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Forchester Street.

Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street.

Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43 Victoria Cap 15: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons or candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and additions of such persons together with the office and Ward's for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
