MINOR BALL ROUNDUP

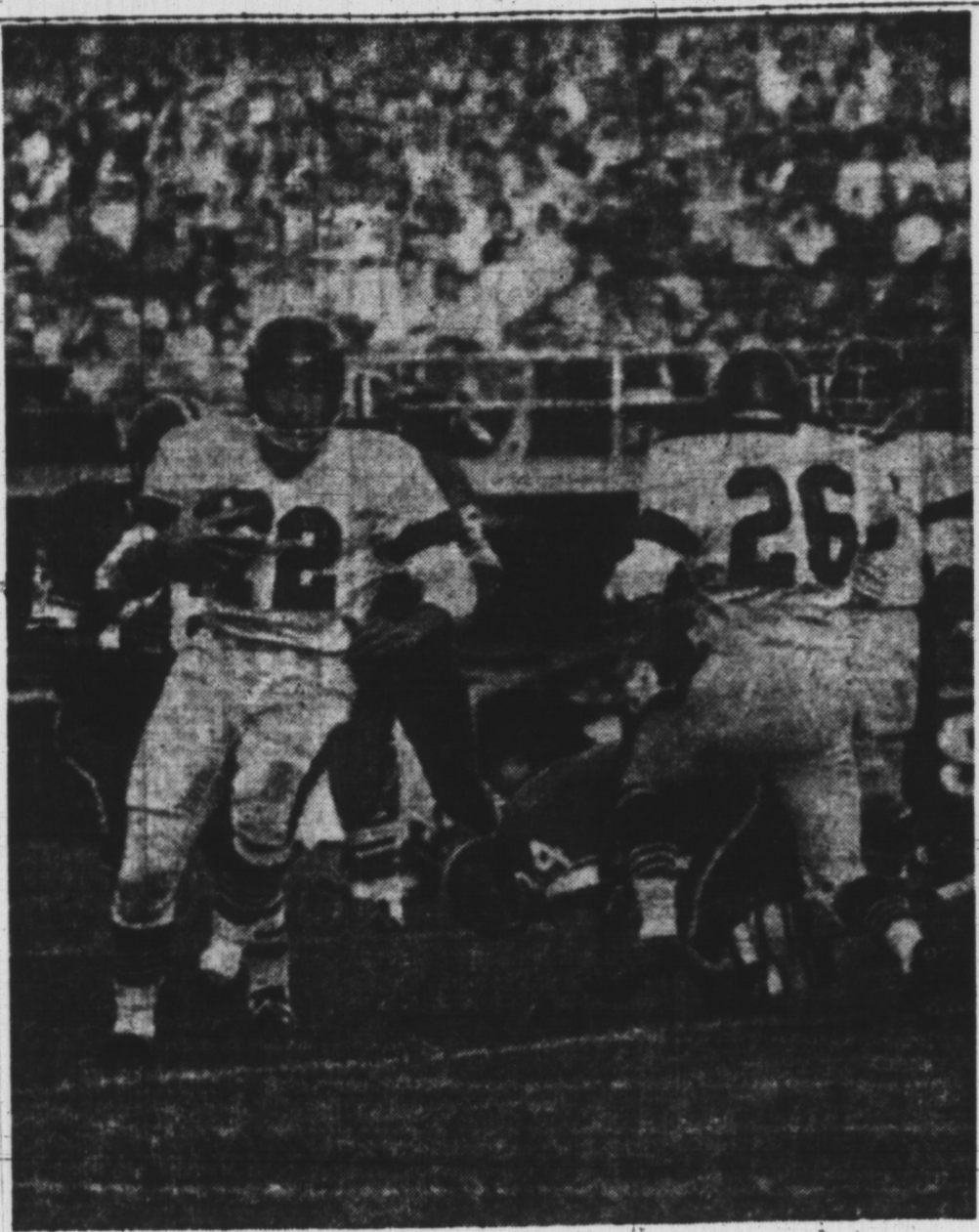

Coach Of Canadian Team Predicts Ten Track Medals

TORONTO (CP) — The best gold-medal performance by Canadian track and field athletes since the Second World War has been predicted for the 1966 British Empire Games in Jamaica next month. Paul Pocz of Toronto, coach of the Canadian track team in the Aug. 4-13 games, sees a possible three golds in the men's events, with a fourth coming from Nancy McCreddie of Brampton, Ont., in the women's shot-put. Pocz, who flew to Edmonton Thursday night with 41 athletes from the Central Ontario Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, predicted a total of 10 medals—gold, silver and bronze—for the team in Jamaica. The Canadian team will be chosen Saturday at the close of the two-day trials in Edmonton. Outstanding candidates for gold medals, Pocz listed as: Bill Crothers of Markham, Ont., in the 200; Harry Jerome, Vancouver, sprints; George Dave, Toronto, discus; and Pave Steen, Burnaby, B.C., shot-put.

CANADA 'MOVES UP' "Canada has moved up in the Commonwealth rankings since the war, especially since 1962," Pocz said in an interview. "We have better coaching, better facilities and more and more people are becoming more knowledgeable. "Grants from the National Fitness Council have helped more people get to more national events. Canadian track and field championships are more truly national today. Grants from the council make it possible for more people to get to these meets in off-Olympic and off - R. E. Games years." Pocz stressed that his selections for a medal must make the team although his gold medal nominees are considered cinches to go to Jamaica. Among the outstanding athletes listed by Pocz—but not necessarily as a medal winner—was Peter Radford, formerly of England, who shared the world record of 30.5 for the 200 yards in 1960. Radford, who won a bronze medal for England in the 1960 Olympics and competed for that country at the R. E. Games in Perth, Australia, in 1962, became eligible for the

Canadian Officials To Nominate Team

EDMONTON (CP) — Canadian track and field officials today will name Canada's track and field team for the 1966 British Empire Games. Wednesday meet chairman Ernie Westerhove of Edmonton agreed to admit about 15 athletes who had missed the deadline in submitting entries for the trials, which end Saturday. Westerhove reversed his decision because there was some dispute availability of entry forms. Officials will debate before the meet ends, charges that coach Lloyd Percival of Toronto gave his athletes stimulants and sedatives before meets. The accusation has been denied by Percival. Half-miler Bill Crothers of

Markham, Ont., leads an impending list of athletes bidding for the trip to Kingston, Jamaica. The team is expected to be a large one, by Canada's standards, because of Jamaica's proximity of Canada. Canada's other big name male entrant in the field of about 200, Harry Jerome of Vancouver, is here to defend his laurels in sprints, but he has told officials he will not be available to compete at Jamaica. His sister, Valerie, is making competitive comeback in women's sprints and her husband, Bob Parker of Vancouver, is under consideration for winning the Canadian decathlon championship two weeks ago.

Dartmouth's Andy's Son Captures Invitational Pace

SUMMERSIDE — Andy's Son, the magnificent four-year-old bay horse owned by Eric and Harry Whistler of Dartmouth, captured the \$4,000 Lobster Carnival Invitational free-for-all here last night. Driven by Jimmy Moore, Andy's Son established a new track record of 2:05 in the first mile of the two-dash event. This was also a new record for the youngster. He paced the second mile in 2:05.1. The old track record of 2:05.4 had been established in 1963 by a Charlottetown horse, Dominion Byrd. The Dartmouth entry made it look easy both trips. He led all the way in the first mile and in the second dash was trailing second to the Charlottetown mare, Eloise Wick until they came under the wire for the first time around. Driver Jimmy Moore then made his move and within a short distance Andy's Son was in the lead and he was never really challenged for the remainder of the race. Along with the \$1,000 share of the purse Andy's Son, who captured the inaugural race here last year, also was awarded a cooler and a trophy emblematic of the race. A second trophy was also presented by the Prince County Horsemen's Club. Yankee Timber, the Jack Brown owned four-year-old black horse from Southport, finished in second place in both miles while Starburn, owned by E. Williamson of Fredericton, N.B., emerged with a 3-3 record. Two other entries were double winners on the night's card. Mr. Jolity captured both the second and sixth dashes while Ohio's Orphan captured both dashes of an invitational event. Single dash winners were: Brown Budlong, Name The Price and Kandy Kid. An exactor on race 4 returned a total of \$126.40 on a combination of Brown Budlong and Shelby Knight. Brown Budlong in this dash paid \$43.60 to win. The double on dashes 1 and 2 paid \$12.60.

The 25-year-old Aimar, in only his second season as a professional, went into the 22nd and last day of the race with an advantage of one minute, 35 seconds over Holland's Jan Janssen, his closest competitor. Aimar, in the 111-kilometre first half of the last leg, and the 51.3-kilometre individual race, against the clock which he won in 4:32.33, kept his lead over the challenging Dutchman.
