from Maritime points. It declared the lowest possible transportation costs were of "paramount importance" to the \$33,000,000-a-year fresh and frozen fish business in that area.

For the Prairie fishery, the brief said, the average increase on fish shipped east from Winnipeg would be 68 per cent. The increases would be a burden to that industry.
