BELGRADE (AP)—Mrs. Ngo Dinh Nhu Thursday defied what she called an "international campaign of blackmail and terror" aimed at South Viet Nam. In spite of this campaign, she said, her country is building democracy. She denounced the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas for waging a "cruel, vicious, subversive war" and claimed there had been no oppression of Buddhists by President Ngo Dinh Diem's government.

JFK Renews Plea For Ban

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy declared Thursday that failure of the U.S. Senate to ratify the limited nuclear test-ban treaty "would be the green light for intensive atmospheric testing by a number of countries."

"You couldn't possibly stop it," he said. "This would be the end of an effort of 15 years. I don't think the United States would want to take on that responsibility."

N.B. Sulky Vet Reins Winner At Yonkers

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP)—Meadow Skipper held off a furious closing rush of the favorite Overrice Thursday night and won the \$163,187.50 Cane Futurity Prize by three-quarters of a length in a blistering finish at Yonkers Raceway. A dozen horses competed in the one mile race, first of the big triple crown series for three-year-old pacers, and Meadow Skipper flashed within one-fifth of a second of the world record for the age and gait on a one-half mile track. Early Arvey, 69-year-old sulky veteran from Woodstock, New Brunswick, drove the winner, owned by the Clearview Stable of Norman Woodworth, Whitnorp, Maine, and he piloted one of the great races of his career.

Refugee Begins Voyage On Raft

MANTOVA, Italy (AP)—An East German refugee intent on reaching the United States set out Thursday in a bid to cross the Atlantic Ocean on a raft. Manfred Hall, 35, headed down the Po River toward the Adriatic Sea on the first leg of his voyage. His raft is 24 feet by 12 feet, fitted with two large sails and a small outboard motor. Supplies include powdered potatoes, margarine, milk, wine, spirits, instant gasoline and alcohol. Hall said he will be confident of reaching New York in about four months.
