ANOTHER STRONG PROTEST.

The Bobcaygeon Independent was always opposed to the Conservatives; but what we are getting now makes it almost desperate.

"When the Liberals were in opposition, they solemnly declared that if entrusted with the management of national affairs they would curtail expenditure, reduce the national debt, diminish taxation.

How have they kept their promise? They have increased the annual expenditure by at least ten millions; they have added ten millions to the national debt, and the taxation is as heavy now as it was under Pacific Scandal Macdonald or Great Stretcher Tupper.

"The defence made by Mr. Laurier, Richard Cartwright and the Liberals is that the increase of the debt was left to them by the Tupper gang, and that the increased expenditure was a necessity.

"This may be true as regards the debt; but the statement as to the increased expenditure is not true.

"Are the taxpayers of Canada imbeciles, that they allow such things to go on?"

"Are they so blinded by the fanaticism of Government and Tory partisanship that they are consenting to tax themselves for political panderers?"

"Have we, in kicking out the Tupper and the nest of traitors, and putting in Laurier and Cartwright, fallen out of the frying-pan into the fire?"

"It looks like it.

"Mr. Laurier came into office under highly favorable circumstances, but unless he changes his policy he will go out in shame and disgrace."

By the way, how is it that the "independent" Guardian, of this city, excuses and supports the Liberals in all this?

Search was made for Mr. McKay where he was found dead in the field, having apparently dropped dead while at work. The deceased was about 84 years of age.
