5,000 Attend Fisheries Exhibition And Regatta

An estimated crowd of 5,000 attended the festivities Saturday at the Souris Fisheries Exhibition and Regatta. This is a gain of nearly 2,000 people over last year.

The large crowd did not attend in vain as the parade and other events far surpassed those of past years for color and interest.

The parade assembled at the Legion Home and was led by an RCMP patrol car followed by the Summerside RCMP Band, the Souris Regional High School Cadets in their first public appearance, and the Souris Sea Cadets.

Conference At Moscow Marks Time

MOSCOW (Reuters) - The Soviet Union and China took a breathing space Sunday in their secret talks to thrash out the ideological differences between the world's two top Communist countries.

A Soviet source said the two delegations did not meet Sunday to continue negotiations opened Saturday in a green-roofed government guest house in the Lenin Hills here.

The Russian team, led by Party Secretary Mikhail Suslov, and the Chinese negotiators, headed by the party's general secretary, Teng Hsiao-ping, were understood to have met for several hours Saturday.

There was no announcement at the end of the day and no reference to the talks was made in the Russian press Sunday morning. Nor did Sunday's newspapers make any reference to the charges and counter-charges made by the two sides over the last two weeks.

Jack Kearns Dies Sunday

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - Jack Kearns, a crafty master of ballroom in hosting's golden era, was in a hospital here in May, but was removed to his son's home after treatment.

His son reported Kearns fell about three weeks ago and broke his arm, but did not return to the hospital. Funeral will be held Wednesday.

Mickey Walker, the former world welterweight and middleweight champion who was managed by Kearns, said in New York "I got the sad news a while ago. He just must have finally worn out."

"We were very close pals, and he was a remarkable guy - big hearted and generous," Walker said at his Manhattan home.

That was between Dempsey and Jack Kearns, who was all you had to say, and when you mentioned the name of Jack Kearns, it was the same way. You didn't have to say anything else."

Only a handful of people knew his real name was John Leo McKernan. His friends just called him Doc.

Fight fans of the current era remember him for his managing of the first \$1,000,000 fight between Max Baer and Archie Moore. The fans of a generation before that remember him for his managing of Dempsey, Walker, the world welterweight and middleweight titles, welterweight champion Jackie Fights and some lesser lights of the game.
