Cancelled Civic Election Will Be Repeated Aug. 12

QUEBEC (CP)—The provincial cabinet has set Aug. 12 for a municipal election in Ste. Genevieve, a municipality near Montreal where the regular election was cancelled when all the ballots vanished.

It is believed to be the first time such a step has been taken by a Quebec government. Premier Duplessis made the announcement at a press conference Thursday and said the election will be carried out under the direction of Aquila Cousineau, a farmer appointed for that purpose to replace Roland Gratton, Ste. Genevieve's secretary-treasurer.

The ballots vanished from Mr. Gratton's home on the eve of the scheduled election July 15. He told police a man forced him at gunpoint to drink a glassful of rye and then he lost consciousness. When he awoke the ballots were gone, he said.

COULD APPOINT MAYOR Provincial police later announced there had been no theft of the ballots, some of which were recovered.

Quebec's small municipalities are governed by a provincial law called the Municipal Code. In the Ste. Genevieve situation the cabinet could appoint a new mayor and three municipal councillors or fix a new election date.

The situation where a municipal election has been called because all the ballots disappeared is a new one in Quebec, no stranger to voting irregularities, and Mr. Duplessis said the government will have to propose some important amendments to the Municipal Code during the next session of the legislature.

He gave no indication of what type of amendments the governing would seek but last week referred to the unusual situation where the cabinet could not amend or correct the municipal assessment role at Ste. Genevieve although it might contain errors or omissions. The assessment roll serves as the basis of electoral lists in small municipalities.

Massachusetts Governor Requests Prayers For Rain

BOSTON (AP) — Residents of Massachusetts were asked today to pray for rain by Governor Foster Furcolo who described a two-months drought as "increasing in alarming proportions."

Most Rev. Richard J. Cushing, Roman Catholic archbishop of Boston, directed priests in his jurisdiction to recite a prayer for rain in daily masses.

Prastic water restrictions were expected to be imposed on 2,500,000 persons in the 27 cities and towns in metropolitan Boston as the only means of protecting public health. The curbs would stop car washing, and filling swimming pools. The state department of public health has declared an emergency in 32 other Bay State cities and towns. This permits local water boards to shut off the supply of persons who disregard directives.

Corruption Probe Is Bugged Down

MONTREAL (CP)—The Herald says an investigation of election-day corruption which led to the brutal beating of returning officer Ruben Levesque has bogged down.

The newspaper said there have been these developments. 1. Dr. Levesque, recovering from injuries suffered when three men attacked him June 28, demanded action against the men who hired the attackers.

2. RCMP officers here said several reports on the election-day irregularities involving forged ballots have been sent to their headquarters in Ottawa.

3. Chief electoral officer Nelson Castonguay, responsible for the inquiry and any action that may follow, said he hasn't received a

report yet from police. 4. Dr. Levesque disclosed that forged ballots seized in Montreal Laurier where he served as returning officer were marked in favor of the Progressive Conservative candidate, Hon. Lionel Chevrier, Liberal candidate and former president of the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority, was elected in the riding by a wide margin.

5. Conservative organizers disclaimed all responsibility for the forgeries and charged opponents had cast the false ballots to smear them.

6. A high Liberal source disclosed that his party had quietly carried out its own investigation into the attack on Dr. Levesque and found evidence that it did in fact stem from the election-day events.

7. Ed Callahan was arrested in Albany, N.Y., for questioning in connection with the attack and now is contesting efforts to have him extradited.

Dr. Levesque, who says he may be permanently crippled as a result of the attack, demanded that political figures employing musclemen be exposed and punished.

In Ottawa, Mr. Castonguay said he is receiving full co-operation from the RCMP. The investigation was still in progress. When it was completed, and if the evidence warranted it, he would take appropriate action against anyone guilty of an offense against the Canada Elections Act.
