GLENWOOD REDMOND

As the result of a highway accident at Cardigan, P.E.I., on the evening of Feb. 7, 1956, the death of Glenwood Redmond ensued early the following morning in the King's County Memorial Hospital at Montague.

He received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church from his Pastor at the scene of the accident, and later having regained consciousness, was attended by Reverend J.W. McCordle.

The late Mr. Redmond, the elder son of Harold Redmond and the late Mary (Rice) Redmond was born on May 15, 1925. He spent his entire life on the homestead at Corvaille which remains as a memorial to his prudence and industry.

He possessed a high standard of Christian ideals, and was sensible always of his obligations toward his church, his family and his community.

Bereaved by his demise are his wife, Mary (Gallant) Redmond, and two small children; Mary Linda and Brendon. Also left to mourn are his father, two sisters, (Catherine) Mrs. Joseph Keough, Somerville, Mass.; (Rita) Mrs. Charles Stewart, Alberty Plains; and one brother Andrew, St. Jean, P.Q.

On Saturday, February 11, 1956, a large funeral cortege moved from his late residence to All Saint's Church in Cardigan where Requiem High Mass was offered by his devoted Pastor, Reverend J.P.E. O'Hanley, P.P., who also officiated at the grave-side. The pall bearers were: Messrs. John D. Campbell, Philip MacEachern, Grover MacKay, Ira MacMillan, Edward Sharkey and Cosmas Sigsworth.

Interment was in the Church Cemetery, ("Requiescat in Pace").

Monte Carlo Rehearsal Held In Torrential Rain Yesterday

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (Reuters) — Prince Rainier and Grace Kelly slipped off through a torrential downpour Monday to a cathedral rehearsal of their wedding, while phalanxes of unknown newspaper men watched a ballet rehearsal to which the prince had deeded them.

Monday night the prince and Grace held separate pre-wedding parties for their closest friends.

The reporters attending a dress rehearsal of a gala performance being prepared at the Monte Carlo opera house by the London and Paris opera ballets when they learned that Rainier and Grace were at the 19th century Roman-style cathedral.

They hurried to the scene to watch the unsmiling couple being rehearsed for the cathedral wedding Thursday by Bishop Gilles Barthes of Monaco and Prince Rainier's American chaplain, Father Francis Tucker. The civil marriage ceremony will take place on Wednesday.

John B. Kelly, father of the bride, was almost expelled from the cathedral by a palace press officer. Kelly was mistaken for a newspaper man as he leaned over his daughter's shoulder and was brusquely ordered to move on.

The 32-year-old prince, in a dark grey suit, and Grace in a beige silk belted coat, looked tired after Sunday night's party given in their honor at the Monte Carlo Sporting Club.

Rainier gnawed his fingernails and looked anxiously at the photographers clustered around him.

Inventories In Canadian Plants Continue Climb

OTTAWA (CP) — Inventories in Canadian factories continued to rise in January, increasing by 5.3 per cent over January 1955.

The stocks of unsold goods rose to \$3,731,073,000, up from \$3,699,233,000 in December and \$3,642,636,000 a year ago, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. Inventories had been rising since last fall, but the increase in December was strong. Shipments of goods from factories in January totalled \$2,597,000,000, down seasonally from the \$1,660,352,000 in December but up from the \$1,391,452,000 in January a year ago.

New orders received during the month totalled \$1,852,849,000, slightly less than the \$1,897,112,000 of December but again higher than the \$1,459,468,000 of January last year.

Unfilled orders at the month-end increased to \$2,698,457,000 from \$2,642,529,000 in December and \$2,538,638,000 a year ago.

Traffic Accident Report For Dec.

OTTAWA (CP) — Traffic accidents in all provinces except Quebec killed 170 persons in December and injured 4,443, the bureau of statistics said Monday.

Number of accidents in the month totalled 17,113. There were 147 accidents involving fatalities, 3,104 causing injuries and 13,862 involving property damage.

Ontario had the biggest number of fatalities with 105 or nearly 62 per cent of the over-all total. Deaths in Newfoundland were two, Nova Scotia 10 and New Brunswick seven. Prince Edward Island had no fatalities.

The Quebec provincial government does not supply the bureau with motor vehicle accident statistics.

SHIPPING OPENS

TROIS-RIVIERES, Que. (CP) — Ocean ships were taking on grain from elevators here Monday as the shipping season got under way after clearance of ice from the St. Lawrence river channel. Two groundings marred the season opening but did not result in serious damage. The 3,305-ton freighter Rio Orinoco and the oil barge Elmbranch went aground but were refloated during the weekend.

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Plan Simulated Nuclear War Test At Gagetown In Summer

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian infantrymen will hold their first divisional test of simulated nuclear warfare this summer at Camp Gagetown N.B., the army announced Monday.

More than 10,500 troops from the 1st Canadian Infantry Division will participate in the exercise at the 427-square-mile training centre. Training will begin at the unit level June 23 and work up to brigade and divisional exercises from July 26 to Aug. 3. Troops will begin moving into camp in the first week of June.

Exercise Morning Star will be the second in the divisional scale in the army's history. It also will mark the first time that troops have been trained in aspects of nuclear battle.

The first divisional exercise was held at Camp Gagetown last summer. Maj.-Gen. E. C. Plov, general officer commanding the army's eastern division, will be in charge of the exercise. His deputy will be Maj.-Gen. J. M. Rockingham, general officer commanding the 1st division.

The army said the use of "nuclear" devices will be indicated by simulated nuclear detonations that will leave little to the imagination of the troops. The RCAF will provide air support for 1st Division and "enemy" forces. Chief umpire for Morning Star will be Brig. M. P. Bogen, director of the Canadian Army Staff College, Kingston, Ont. Students of the college also will be used as umpires.

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
