THROWN FROM CARRIAGES.

Yesterday afternoon a countryman named Court was driving on Queen Street, near Norton & Fenell's store, the wheel of his carriage came in contact with the wheel of a sloop standing on the street, with the result that Mr. Court's wagon was upset and he was thrown violently to the ground. The upsetting of the carriage caused the breaking of one of the shafts and the single-tree, and it did not take the horse long to dissolve partnership with the vehicle. Mr. Court held on to the reins, however, and was dragged along the hard street by the horse for several yards, or until Messrs. T. Berrigan and P. Trainor, who were eyewitnesses of the accident, stopped the horse. Mr. Court was stunned for a short time as a result of the fall. Had he fallen upon his head instead of his shoulder, as he did, his injuries would likely have been fatal.
