Girl Guide Camp Report

Miss Suzanne MacKinnon, Provincial Camp Commissioner, reported as follows:
One Provincial Girl Guide Camp was held in Prince Edward Island last summer at the K. of C. Camp site at North Rustico. There were 89 Guides and 13 staff attended. Camp Guides from Southport, Dunstaffnage, Central Rustico, Borden, Tignish, North Rustico, Marshfield, Summerside, Souris and Charlottetown and ten Lone Guides. Two Guides from New Brunswick were guests of the Camp this being an exchange between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, two of our Guides attending Camp at St. Andrews, N. B.

During the year several sites were visited by the Camp Committee with a view to procuring a Camp site, however none of these appeared suitable.

Upon receiving a report from Miss Arsenault of the meeting of the Canadian Camping Association which recommended the use of National Parks as Camp sites, a letter was sent to Ottawa asking for information about such a Camp site, and it was found that a Camp site could be procured in the National Park, and it is hoped that we may be able to make use of this Camp site in the future.

There are at present seven licensed campers in Prince Edward Island, and Miss Betty King has now completed her course and will receive her license.

Miss Lucille MacQuaid of Summerside has been accepted as a Camp Counselor in U. S. A., Camp at Jacksonville, Florida for two months July and August.

I wish to thank the Camp Committee for their valued assistance and advice and all others who have helped in carrying out our Camping Program.

Girl Guide Public Relations Report

The report of the Public Relations branch of the Girl Guides Association was presented at the annual meeting yesterday by Miss Lillian Duchemin, P. R. Commissioner. It follows:

Highlight of the year was the visit of our Chief Guide for Canada, Mrs. B. E. S. Wishart, and for many weeks prior to her visit in October, as well as while she was with us, we endeavoured to publicize all Guide activities and functions in which she was to participate. In this way we hoped that these interested would be able to arrange to meet with and hear our Chief Guide's message wherever she was scheduled to speak, and for those who found it impossible we did our best to give them as clear a picture as we could by means of the press. At the semi-annual meeting of the Provincial Girl Guides Association held during Mrs. Wishart's visit, a report was given of the Conference of Maritime Guide Commissioners which had been held in Moncton, N. B., last April and it was my privilege to interview Mrs. Wishart over a C. F. C. Y. broadcast at which time she sent a special message to all Girl Guides and Brownies in the Province. Also a photograph of the Chief Guide's arrival at the Summerside Airport was published in the Summerside Journal and Charlottetown Guardian.

Approximately 200 copies of the newly published Public Relations leaflet—"The Canadian Girl Guide's Association" have been distributed provincially. If there are others who feel they can further Guiding by distributing this leaflet—which sets out clearly the principles of Guiding, the aims of the organization, Leadership, Promises and Laws of Guides and Brownies—a copy of which is now in front of each of you—I should be very pleased to furnish copies to them free of charge on receipt of a request for same.

Matters of Dominion-wide interest emanating from meetings of the Dominion Public Relations Committee have been brought to the attention of our Provincial Executive, and, when necessary, appropriate action has been forthcoming as a result.

Mimeographed material for use at Pack and Company meetings in celebration of "Guiding Day" was ready from Headquarters and distributed to Captains and Brown Owl's requesting assistance.

All meetings of the Provincial Executive have been attended and fully reported in the press regularly, along with other items of special interest in the Guide world.

As a result of personal interviews and correspondence with Mr. Atkinson and Mr. Ford of the National Parks Branch, Department of Mines and Resources, we have been successful in securing a very excellent site in the P. E. I. National Park—near Stanhope—for the holding of a Camp this coming summer.

It is hoped that the work of Public Relations during the past

year may have assisted materially in bringing to the attention of those who otherwise knew little of the wide scope of our Movement the worth-whileness of its far reaching program, and thus encourage them to give it full support in the future.

In closing, I wish to express thanks to our Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. MacDonald, for her co-operation at all times, which has been deeply appreciated. Thanks are also extended to the press—The Charlottetown Guardian, The Charlottetown Patriot, The Summerside Journal and the Summerside Pioneer for the great part they played in this game of Guiding by publishing—free of charge—the many news items submitted to them; and to radio station C. F. C. Y., Charlottetown, and C. H. C. K., Summerside, for their courtesy in granting us free time to broadcast special events, etc. These gestures on the part of the press and radio have done much to promote the great volunteer youth training program of Guiding in this province. We are deeply grateful to them—and all—for past courtesies, and bespeak their continued co-operation in the future.
