Large mackerel are now being taken in great numbers off the Island coast. The sailing schooner General Gordon, on Wednesday last, is reported to have taken seventy barrels in one dip.

The Rev. W. B. King, formerly Curate of St. Peter's, Charlottetown, is to return to his old charge, and carry on the work until an incumbent has been secured for the parish.—Church Guardian.

The sailing schooner General Middleton, owned by Macdonald, Macdonald & Co., arrived at Souris on Thursday with a full cargo of large mackerel. This is the second trip landed since the 20th of July. Capt. McLean reports fish very plentiful.

SPORTS.—We learn that at the annual sports in Pictou, Mr. Daniel McDonald, of the Post Office Department, won second prize in the hundred yards running race, and Mr. Duceson Stewart, son of Mr. Peter Stewart, Dundas, won twenty-two dollars in prizes.

It is the intention of the railway authorities to build a station at Peske's, and make other improvements at that place. They also intend to erect a dwelling for the station master at St. Peter's. Tenders for the work are advertised in another column.

The Rev. E. A. Harris is visiting P. E. Island. The Rev. gentleman is doing a good work at Mshone Bay. The new church there is progressing rapidly. The recent tea-meeting brought in about \$400 to the building fund.—Church Guardian.

The Montreal Telegraph of Sept. 2nd says: "The Marchioness of Lansdowne, with the Earl of Kerry and Lord Charles Fitzmaurice, left Hamden House, Green Street, on Tuesday evening, for Scotland, on a visit to the Dowager Marchioness of Lansdowne at Monkton."

HOLSTEIN CATTLE.—The Gothenburg City, which arrived at Halifax Tuesday evening from London, brought a fine herd of Holstein cattle, consisting of five cows and a bull, purchased in Holland by Mr. J. C. Mahon, of Truro, in June last. The cattle arrived in fine condition and were inspected by several well known cattle fanciers in Halifax, who pronounced them first-class in every particular. Mr. Mahon intends to place them on his farm at Truro, and deserves credit for his enterprise. The Gothenburg City also brought a few Holsteins for Mr. Corbett, of Ontario. These cattle are highly prized for dairy purposes.

THE ROLLERS.—A large audience assembled at the Roller Rink last evening to witness the second final heat for the gold medal. At half-past nine the skaters—Brecken, Newsom, Large and Trainor—were given the word "go." Large took the lead, with Newsom second, Brecken third, and Trainor—who had unfortunately fallen prostrate on the floor, at the start—brought up the rear. In the third lap Brecken passed Newsom, and went lively for Large, who made a game effort to maintain his lead. In the meantime Trainor had made up for the mishap at the start, and relegated Newsom to fourth place. The contest for a time between Large, Brecken and Trainor was exceedingly close. At length Brecken shot past Large and sprang to the front. Trainor also gave Large the "go by," and fought hard with Brecken for first place. When the contest between these two skaters was at its most exciting pitch, Brecken broke a roller, and was obliged to abandon the contest. Trainor shot to the front, but was evidently "winded," and could not maintain his lead. Large then took first place, but gradually succumbed to Newsom, who had already passed Trainor. Newsom skated gamely to the finish, coming in the victor by about half a lap, with Large second and Trainor third. The third preliminary heat will be skated on Tuesday evening, and the final heat on Thursday evening next.

A Triumphant Tour.

LONDON, Sept. 18. Mr. Chamberlain is making a triumphant political tour of Scotland. The people are greeting him with the greatest enthusiasm, and cheers were given for "England's future Premier."

DUBLIN, Sept. 18.

United Ireland discusses the probable result of England following the policy indicated in Mr. Chamberlain's speech. It says that such a course would probably result in the French army landing at Limerick simultaneously with an Irish conflagration in all the principal cities in England, and well-planned attacks on various palaces and banks in London.

A Colliery Accident.

LONDON, Sept. 18. A despatch from Derby states that a serious accident occurred at Oxwell Colliery, Kilstone, eight miles from Derby. The shaft of the colliery has been blocked, and three hundred men are entombed. Great efforts are being made to rescue them.

LATER.

LONDON, Sept. 18. The miners have been rescued with great difficulty.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. Mayor Grace, of this city, has been invited to attend the meeting of the Annexation League, which will be held at Niagara Falls on November 15, as it was explained to the President of the organization, which investigated the case, Riel was arrested on American soil.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18. Sir Charles Tupper left yesterday on a trip to Winnipeg and British Columbia. He goes to seek information in reference to the Indian and Colonial Exhibition, and to arouse the colonies to make a good display at the coming Exhibition.

Honors to be Conferred on North-west Troops.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18. Information has been received by the Militia and Defence Department that the Imperial medal will be conferred on the troops recently engaged in the North-west Rebellion.

Aquatic.

PORTLAND, Sept. 18. An agreement has been signed for a double scull race between Hanlan and Lee, and Cunley and Courtney. The distance will be three miles with a turn for a thousand dollars a side.

A Total Wreck.

NORTH SYDNEY, Sept. 18. The steamer Juliet, from Quebec for London with a cargo of deals, went ashore yesterday at the entrance of Bras d'Or Lake. She will probably be a total wreck.

Visiting the Mines.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18. The visiting American Engineers started this morning to visit the mines in Cape Breton, Pictou and other parts of the Province. The reception last evening was a brilliant affair.

Gladstone's health is now fully restored. Prof. Huxley, on account of impaired health, will live hereafter in Italy.

Peter the Great's boots, the original model of the "Wellington's" are still exhibited as curious relics in St. Petersburg.

Three hundred and twenty thousand dollars have been contributed toward the erection of a cancer hospital for women in New York.

The London Daily News' Berlin despatch says the Carolines may be already regarded as German property. The entire affair can only terminate with the assertion of Germany's claims.

Advices from Tamatava say that the Italian consul has failed in his mediation between the Hovas and French, and that the latter are resuming hostilities and have bombarded Maranjura.

Lord Salisbury and all other members of the cabinet will have returned to London by next week. Lord Randolph Churchill health has been restored, but he will postpone his reappearance in public until after Lord Salisbury's campaign speech.

The majority of the cable companies have reduced their rates. The details are unknown yet. The rate from England to Australia will be 8s. 8d. per word, for ordinary, and 2s. 8d. for press messages, and to Bombay and Madras 7s. 6d. and perhaps 5s. 3d.

Letters from China represent that France lost 15,000 men in the Tonquin campaign, and that her losses in money, including the cost of building forts, hospitals and frontier defences, were \$215,000,000, while China's losses were 100,000 men and \$190,000,000.

Mr. Gladstone and Lord Rosebery have each written a letter for publication, stating that the question of the disestablishment of the Scotch Church is purely a matter for Scotchmen to deal with and ought not to be made a test question at the coming parliamentary election. At the last session of parliament there were 1,761 petitions, with 69,022 signatures against the church of Scotland disestablishment bill, and only 108 petitions, with 2,770 signatures in favor of the bill.
