

Northern Health Service Set Up

OTTAWA, (CP)—Establishment of a northern health service to serve the 26,000 Canadians living in the 1,500,000 square miles north of the 60th parallel was announced Wednesday by the federal government.

ditions in the north can be met adequately only by a co-ordinated effort.

The northern health service is to be established as a division of the health department. The new agency will not supersede any of the existing organizations. It will bring them together and help co-ordination of policy and planning.

The service will also operate its own hospitals, public health and nursing services and other facilities required for national defence staff and for Eskimos and Indians.

Some species of hummingbirds can fly backwards for short distances while feeding in the air.

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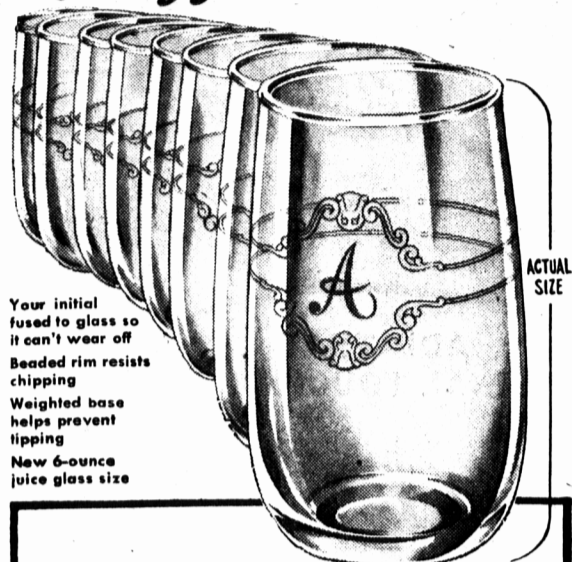
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constipation, frustrations of various kinds, emotional tensions and allergic episodes. Occasionally, the number of attacks will increase during some phase of the monthly period in women. Even a state of boredom due to deadly lack of occupation or recreation may increase the tendency to seizures. In many instances, the institution of general hygienic measures and psychiatric care are more important than drugs in controlling seizures.

In utilizing the drug treatment of epilepsy, it is advisable to begin with a single drug, gradually increasing the dose until either control or maximum effect is obtained or the dose is reached beyond which toxic (poisonous) symptoms develop. Some patients respond better to one drug than another and still other patients do best on a combination of drugs.

"Medication to prevent seizures is usually prescribed three times a day. This is occasionally reduced to two doses but in some cases four or five are needed. When all spells occur at night, it is permissible to prescribe a single dose before the patient retires. For special occasions inducing stress or excitement—birthdays, holidays, and menstrual periods—it may be necessary to increase the dose temporarily." I have been quoting Dr. Meyer A. Perlestein of the Children's Neurology Clinic and Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago.

So far as drugs are concerned, phenobarbital is the drug of choice, followed closely by Dilantin Sodium. When phenobarbital controls the seizures, no other drug is needed. The dose of Sodium Dilantin varies from one grain to 1½ grains. Needless to say, these drugs must be taken under close medical supervision.

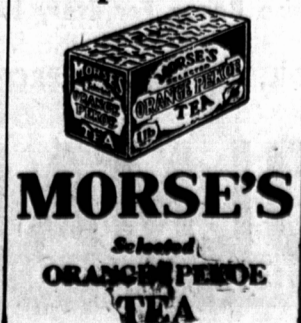

tingency. There was no assurance that this extra trick could be established, but there was at least a chance, and it could not cost South anything to try for it. He should have unhesitatingly ducked the opening lead, playing the heart six as a false card to let West get the impression that his partner might be signalling for a heart continuation. If West refused to take the bait, that could not be helped, but West certainly might be lulled into a false sense of security and continue with hearts in the belief that his partner had the ace. If West fell into this trap, South would win the second heart lead with the jack (or the ace, depending on West's second play), and easily get rid of a diamond from dummy on the other heart honor. It is true that West would have to be rather gullible—but many players are.



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
