DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 14. Davin took up the time of the House all afternoon to-day, but his five attempts at legislation, four were snuffed out at the request of Hon. Edgar Dewdney.

Mr. Davin's fifth resolution relating to the prevention of Prairie fires being started from locomotives was withdrawn in consequence of a declaration by Dewdney that legislation on this subject is to be introduced by and by.

In the evening, the bill to incorporate the Banker's Safe Deposit Co. was passed and the title changed to Dominion Safe Deposit Company.

Davin's motion for a commission of inquiry into Commissioner Herchmer of the Northwest Mounted Police was taken up, Davin speaking on Watson's amendment.

After considerable discussion, Sir John Macdonald announced that Herchmer, having requested a strict inquiry, it was the intention to have a departmental investigation into the management of the police.

Watson's amendment, asking an investigation of Herchmer, was lost by 76 to 52. Davin's motion was declared lost also, and the House adjourned at 12 55.

The Northwest Territories Bill is fixed for the committee stage in the Senate to-morrow, when Senator Bellerose's motion to strike out the clause concerning the dual language is expected to give rise to an animated discussion.

Dalton McCarthy is today reported as saying that when the bill reaches the Commons he will oppose this clause. This intended action of Messrs. Bellerose and McCarthy against the compromise arrived at by the House of Commons is only further proof of the wisdom of that settlement.

TRADE NOTES.—Flour has advanced about 15 cents per barrel during the last week. The advance is due to the great demand for wheat, May wheat being quoted in Chicago at 74 cts. or an advance of seven cents over the lowest point.

STEAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—The steamer M. A. Starr will leave early to-morrow morning for Pictou. The steamer St. Lawrence will probably leave for the same place on Thursday morning.

As soon as Summerside harbor opens, a steamer will leave for that port.

SHOULD BE ATTENDED TO.—The plankway along the north side of Easton Street, between the residence of A. L. Brown, Esq., and the Salvation Army Barracks, is in a dangerous condition. A goodly portion of the plankway near the Barracks was removed to the gutter last evening, much to the inconvenience and annoyance of the people living in that neighborhood. We trust that the matter will be attended to at once.

BOSTON PRICES.—A circular of the 10th says: We have to report a continued dull trade in eggs, with a further decline in prices. Eastern extras are dull at 13c., and could not be sold except in a small way at over 12c. The arrivals of potatoes continue light, and a further advance in prices has been made this week, but demand at the higher prices is confined to small lots. Island Cheneaugos bring 70 cents. The general condition of the fish market is unchanged.

MANUFACTURERS' MEETING.—A meeting of manufacturers was held in the office of Warburton & Smallwood, last evening. The meeting, although small, was representative. The object of the meeting was to consider whether it would be better to have prizes offered for their exhibits at the forthcoming Provincial Exhibition, or to exhibit without competing for prizes. The general opinion was that it would be better in the interests of all concerned, not to have prizes offered,—to simply make an exhibit and allow the people to judge as to its merits.

ANOTHER POISONING CASE.—A young woman named Christy McKenzie, belonging to Wood Islands, died at the residence of Mrs. George Lowe, King Street East, last evening. Her death was the result of drinking water in which matches had been soaked. Her story is that one night last week she felt thirsty, and that she went into the kitchen for a drink of water. There was no light in the kitchen, and, instead of taking the water from the bucket, she drank what she found in a cup. After she drank the water, she says she discovered a card of matches in the cup. Some time afterwards she took ill, and by Thursday her illness became so severe that Dr. Conroy was called in. The doctor did all in his power for the poor girl, but without avail. She lingered until last evening, when she died, as stated above. Miss McKenzie had only been in town a few days, and was living with Mrs. Lowe until such time as she could procure a situation as servant.
