The Alberton Exhibition was held yesterday afternoon and the management reported a good attendance. Owing to the exhibition being held a little earlier than usual, there was not such a large showing of vegetables, but the livestock show was much larger than former years. The horse exhibit was outstanding in numbers and quality.
