placement to officiate.

in their game with the Mariners.

and picked up an assist.

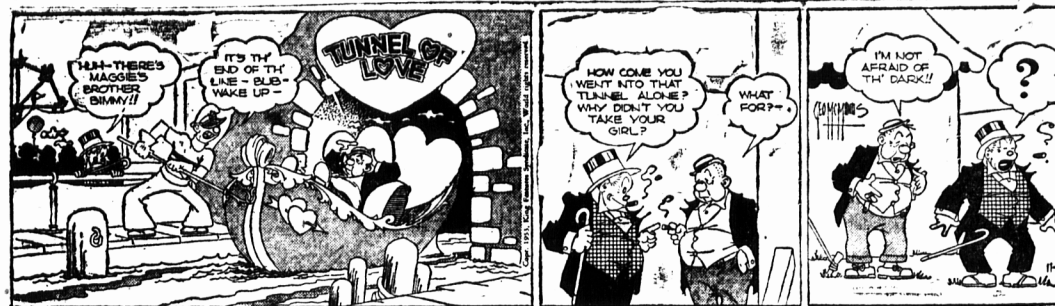
