HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says cool, dry air will spread across the Maritimes early today and skies will clear in all sections except Prince Edward Island and eastern Nova Scotia, where some cloud will remain.  
Forecasts:  
Northern Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island: Cloudy with a few sunny intervals; a little cooler; north winds 15. Low-high at New Glasgow 40 and 45. Charlottetown 37 and 45.  
New Brunswick: Sunny; not much change in temperature; north winds 15. Low-high at Moncton and Fredericton 35 and 48, Saint John 35 and 45, Edmundston and Campbellton 28 and 40.  
Bay of Fundy: North winds 20, diminishing in the afternoon to northeast 15. Sunny with visibility 10 miles a little cooler.  
High tide today at Charlottetown at 12.3 a.m. and 11.44 a.m. At Rustico at 6.43 a.m. and 8.42 p.m. Summerside tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 4.57 a.m. and sets at 7.23 p.m.
