

Local and Other Items.

A LIVELY PORT.—There were 112 vessels in port at Halifax on Monday, including ten steamers.

PHILHARMONIC.—The Philharmonic Society had a good practice last evening, notwithstanding the weather.

A PAYING ROAD.—The Canada Pacific railway people were jubilant when the returns for the month of September were handed in. The net earnings for the road during the last month was \$370,000 in excess of the corresponding month last year, or an increase of 105 per cent.

CONCERT.—A Harvest and Thanksgiving Concert will be given by the Sunday School scholars of the Upper Prince Street Methodist Church, assisted by an adult chorus, on the evening of the 14th Nov. The church will be appropriately decorated with the various products of church and field. The programme will be published next week.

A VESSEL "MANNED" BY WOMEN.—The schooner Mand B. Wetherell, Capt. McDonald, recently arrived at Provincetown, manned (?) entirely by women, with the exception of the captain, who spoke in the highest terms of the discipline and efficiency of the crew. The vessel is no small boat, but a schooner of 107 tons.—Cape Cod Item.

Liberal-Conservative Triumph Away West!

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.

Thomas Earle, straight Conservative, was elected by acclamation for Victoria, British Columbia, to-day, vice Baker, resigned.

The Candy Poisoning Case.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 29.

At to-night's session in the preliminary examination of McDonald, the prosecution did something which was never heard of before in the history of trials or an investigation in this city. It was the putting on the stand of J. A. McLean, clerk in the office of C. A. Stockton, the prisoner's counsel. Mr. Stockton protested strongly against such a proceeding, and declared that the crown was acting in a most undignified manner in attempting to secure any line of his defence which the clerk might have secured in a confidential way. The magistrate allowed McLean to be sworn, and Mr. Stockton objected to nearly every question asked, but all were allowed. The object of putting McLean on the stand was to show that under Mr. Stockton's instruction he had visited some fifty establishments in the city in search of boxes similar to those in which the poisoned candy had been sent, but was unable to find any.

Wholesale Smuggling Reported.

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.

Joseph Gabriel, a British Columbia mine owner from Victoria, in an interview last night said that about the largest part of the commerce between British Columbia and the United States is in opium and China-men, which he declares are smuggled by wholesale.

The blame of the sealing trouble is laid upon the British Government, which, after telling the people they had a right to fish for seals, refused to protect them. Great Britain, he said, was a positive handicap to progression in the country. Gabriel declares that the people of Victoria are almost unanimous for annexation to the United States.

Davitt's Big Speech.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

Michael Davitt resumed his address before the Parnell Commission to-day. He said that the authors of the articles on "Parnellism and Crime" wilfully invented and garbled quotations from American papers. They distorted everything relating to the movements of the Irish in America. He said the Clan-na-Gael was not an assassination society, or any more of a secret society than the Order of Freemasons of England.

To Be Withdrawn.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.

The owners of the line of steamers now doing business between Vancouver and China and Japan, in connection with the Pacific railway, have notified the railway company of their determination to terminate the contract of the trans-Pacific steamers. They will not accept any freight or passengers after November 22nd. This means the withdrawal of the steamers from the route and trade between the Dominion and China will have to go via San Francisco.

In Financial Difficulties.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 29.

H. A. Cropley, publisher of the Capital, is in financial difficulties. John McMillan, of St. John, is here taking charge of the business. A report is current that C. H. Lagrin, Secretary for Agriculture, will continue the publication of the Capital.

Large Railroad Combines.

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.

A special to the Herald says that evidence continues to accumulate that a New York bankers' triangle in engineering various large railroad combinations now in process of formation, and that it is their object to ultimately unite them in one gigantic railway.

They Cannot Come In.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.

Acting Secretary Batchelor has decided that Chinese laundrymen are laborers within the meaning of the Restrictive Act, and therefore prohibited from landing in the United States, no matter whether they have been here before or not.

The world's series of baseball games ended to-day by New York securing its sixth victory out of the nine games played. Today's score was 3 to 2 in favor of New York.

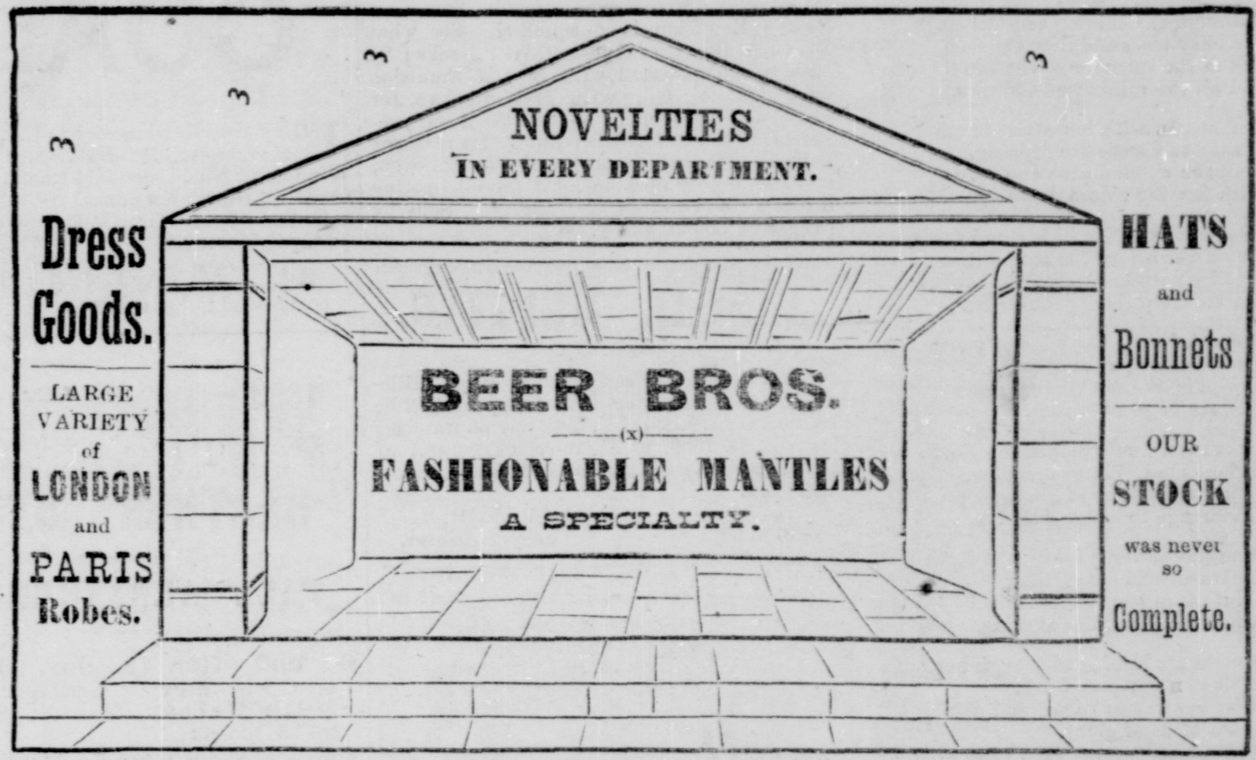
