Harmony seemed to be the keynote in the Maritime Basketball tournament staged here Saturday. Nobody appeared worried that the other fellow was going to put anything over on him. It indeed was a happy situation.

Charlottetown Trotters finally won the Maritime championship trouncing both mainland entrants, Cape Breton All Stars and Centerville, N.B. Legionaires. The Trotters-Legionaires tussle was a dramatic one with all the chips on the line. Both teams had previously whipped the All Stars and this was the battle of the giants.

Well Centerville looked like sure winners with the minutes ticking off rapidly. Trotters were down seven points with four minutes remaining and there was no great indication that the deficit could be made up.

Trotters had won and their supporters were jubilant. Centerville naturally was a disappointed squad and the band of loyal supporters who had accompanied them to Charlottetown had a little let-down. But they took it all without a bawl and went on their way.

Came Sunday night and the harmony was no more. We were rebuffed when our teletype pounded out a story stating that the title was claiming the title because the president of the Maritime Basketball League, Don Hepburn, had acted as referee.

These were the same Legionaires who had exhibited such sportsmanship only a night previous, the same team that agreed without a murmur to the referees and even after their heart-breaking loss had not a word to say about the verdict.

Their claim to the crown is about the silliest thing you can imagine. They make no statement of any protest having been made, merely the ridiculous assertion that they are claiming the title. They will know how far any protest would go, so they sense enough to omit the word 'protest' in their Canadian press item. Their action is baby-like and certainly not what you would expect from a classy hoop outfit like the Centerville team.

It is indeed regrettable that this tournament should have cheap repercussions. The Trotters certainly did their part to make the affair a success and as of Saturday night everyone thought it had been a success.

However once back home the Legionaires had a change of heart, a change which is definitely unbecoming to a club of their calibre. It is indeed a pity that they ever let so assine a referee as theirs get to the sports pages of Maritime papers.

They know they were licked fairly and squarely. They know they agreed to the referees' decision. They know they had no argument while they were in Charlottetown about getting such a ruling as a raw deal. They know they have no claim whatever to the title. And finally they know they haven't got a leg to stand on as far as a protest is concerned.

All of which makes Centerville's unusual procedure since bowing to the Trotters nothing more than sour grapes. And man, are they sour.

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
