### Coroner's Jury Finds Death Due To Accidental Drowning

GEORGETOWN — A coroner's jury, at an inquest held in the courthouse here last night before King's county coroner, Dr. George Inman of Montague, found that Ernest Felton Brown, of Dingwell's Mills came to his death on June 5th, 1958, at Fortune River King's county, by accidental drowning and found no blame attached to Floyd Archibald MacKenzie.

The jury recommended fishermen use caution in smaller boats at all times.

Three witnesses were heard, Floyd Archibald MacKenzie of Fortune Bridge; Sterling Burke of Fortune Bridge and R.C.M.P. Constable Ronald Lawford, who in June was stationed at Souris.

The evidence indicated that the deceased, Brown, was hired by MacKenzie for the lobster fishing season.

## 13-Month Quarry Workers Strike At Windsor Ends

WINDSOR, N.S. (CP) — One of the longest strikes in the Maritimes' labor history ended Wednesday when members of the Nova Scotia Quarry Workers Union (CLC) voted to return to the jobs they left nearly 13 months ago.

By a vote of 147-52 the union decided to accept the Canadian Gypsum Company's latest offer. The United States-controlled company offered to rehire all but 30 of about 400 employees on the payroll at the start of the strike Oct. 31, 1957.

The settlement followed an appeal from Premier Stanfield asking both sides to submit remaining differences to arbitration. The company said the 30 men in question committed acts during the strike that warranted their discharge. Their cases will be studied by an arbiter.
