

Vessel Missing

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — A United States Air Force plane began looking Friday for a 46-foot fishing vessel unreported off the northeast coast of Newfoundland since Wednesday.

The S. J. Hodder, carrying four men, left Bonavista at noon Wednesday to fish near Baccalieu Island between Trinity and Conception bays. She was scheduled to return that night.

Officials at Bonavista said it was possible the ship developed engine trouble. The aircraft from Argentia and the government vessel Acadia were searching the area Friday.

Blind Musician Located After A Year's Search

A contestant in the 1954 Canadian Championship Old Time Fiddlers Contest sponsored by the Shelburne (Ontario) Rotary Club was a blind young man named Bill MacCormack, from Prince Edward Island.

Shortly after the contest the club, impressed with the young man's musical ability, both vocal and instrumental, and his courageous demeanour in spite of his handicap, voted \$100 towards the purchase of a seeing-eye dog for him.

Unfortunately, the Shelburne club officials were unable to locate Mr. MacCormack, and all this time the money has been kept in trust awaiting such time as he might turn up again.

At the present time the objective of Bill and his wife, who is necessarily his constant guide, is to find ways and means of making recordings of some of his most popular songs so that they may be had by the public.

Being a member of a family gifted with musical talents, Bill's musical career did not begin until he was 14 years of age, when, while at the School for the Blind, he began playing different instruments and took some vocal instruction.

Within the past three years Bill has personally composed lyrics and music for ten songs which have proved extremely popular wherever they are heard. One of these, "You're My One and Only Girl," was written for his wife, and its appealing tune and tempo, together with the sincere thoughts expressed, has given it the nomination of another of his compositions, "A Blind Boy's Prayer" in which he unconsciously gives an accurate description of his own pleasant and cheerful personality with the words "My little world is darkness, but there is sunshine in my heart."

Anti-Polio Immunization Safest Early In The Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Resumption of Canada's anti-polio immunization program will be delayed until early next year, Health Minister Martin announced Friday.

1. Period of greatest risk from inoculations comes in July, August and September and sometimes in October and November.

Because the Christmas holiday makes inoculations difficult during December, "it would appear that injections could be carried out with the greatest degree of safety during the first half of the year."

2. Dr. Jonas Salk, who developed the vaccine, recommended that the greatest benefit from the third injection would be obtained if it were given at least seven months after the second shot.

3. Connaught laboratories and the Institute of Microbiology, at Montreal, which will begin alkalinizing production early this fall, will be able to build up a "stockpile" to ensure no interruption of delays in the program and to make deliveries to all provinces in an orderly and equitable manner.

4. It should be possible to carry through the immunization program early in the New Year with a minimum of dislocation in normal school activities.

5. Administration of inoculations in all provinces during approximately the same period will facilitate public education efforts.

6. Connaught and the Institute of Microbiology in the next few months will be able to take full advantage of any new production techniques which might be developed as the result of studies now being made in Canada and the United States.

Children receive the vaccine free. The federal government pays half the cost, the provinces the other half.

Children so far inoculated have been those in the first two grades of public school, except in Quebec where two- and three-year-olds received the injections first.

Some 880,000 children received at least two of the three injections before the program was halted at the end of June. It is planned to give these children their third shots and at least another 2,000,000 two shots by the end of next March.
