The following New Year's message to the citizens of Prince Edward Island has been issued by Group Captain J.E. Creeper, D.F.C., C.D., commanding officer, RCAF Station, Summerside.

"During the year 1958 there have been many changes at RCAF Station, Summerside, one of which was my appointment as commanding officer. I would like to take this, my first opportunity since assuming command, to wish the citizens of Prince Edward Island a very prosperous and happy New Year on behalf of the officers, airmen and all women of the station.

"The RCAF has finished another phase in its program of expansion and this expansion has certainly been reflected at this station. During 1958 many new construction projects were commenced and the next few years will see the completion of these projects as well as the start of several more which are planned.

"This construction is being undertaken to prepare the station for the arrival of the RCAF's newest anti-submarine aircraft, The Argus. The employment of local workers for these projects not only assists the economy of the province but increases the efficiency of our air station as an integral part of Canada's defence system.

"The Hillcrest housing development presently taking shape in the Town of Summerside will provide housing for additional RCAF personnel who will be transferred to this station in the near future. The resulting association between RCAF personnel and their families will more than ever foster the spirit of comradeship which exists between the "Islanders" and the RCAF.

OTTAWA (CP)—Sales to India, Ceylon and France of \$200,000 worth of cobalt 60 therapy units... cancer treatment were announced Tuesday by the commercial products division of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited.

The crown-owned company said the shipment—moved from Ottawa to Saint John, N.B., by rail—is the largest made in the Western world. It consists of five therapy units and six cobalt 60

sources which provide the gamma rays to attack cancer. Three of the units and their sources were shipped aboard the freighter City of Ottawa Tuesday for clinics in India and a fourth went to Ceylon. They are being paid for out of Colombo Plan funds.
