Homeward Bound.

We reached the Court House in Wash-
ington just in time to see Judge Porter
take the assassin in hand. Judge Porter
enjoys the reputation of being one of the
ablest jurists in the United States. As a
cross-examiner, he is, probably, unsurpass-
ed. Guiteau knew that he would be on
the rack for several days, and it is little
wonder that he seemed disconcerted and
nervous. His voice was not strong, but he
gesticulated wildly. He stated that he had
eaten too much on Thanksgiving Day, and
was consequently indisposed. Guiteau is a
glutton as well as a murderer.
Up to this time, Judge Porter had
taken little part in the proceedings. But
all at once, he suddenly assumed the lead-
ership and conducted the cross-examina-
tion in a manner that fully sustained the
brilliant reputation that he has acquired as
a lawyer. No more thrilling scene has
ever been witnessed in an American Court-
room. Slowly he began, at first puzzling
Guiteau's brain with questions about his
career.
"You are a man of truth?" he would
remark inquiringly, "or you are a man of
persistence and determination?" before
the prisoner could more than finish his
answer to a previous question. Then
ticking his vanity by two or three ques-
tions which drew from him an expression
that when he once understood a task he
never gave it up, the lawyer asked, "You
determined to kill General Garfield, did
you not?"
Guiteau declined to answer, but a
moment later said he committed the act
under the inspiration of the Deity. Dropping
this subject instantly, Judge Porter led
the witness again into a review of his
career as a lawyer, or as a member of the
Oneida community, only to pounce on him
with a question bearing upon the tragedy.
"Did the Deity borrow the money with
which to purchase that murderous pistol?"
he asked, in thunder tones, his voice trem-
bling with emotion. Again came, "Did
you contemplate the President's removal
by any other means than murder?" "I
don't like that word murder," shouted
Guiteau, "It places a wrong construction
on the case." "It is a harsh word, but
there it is," said Judge Porter.
The prisoner's face was by turns ashy
pale, and again flushed with excitement.
His eyes glared wildly, and raising his
hands, and then bringing them down on
the rail, he shouted, "If that act had been
committed on my account there is no
punishment too great for me, but acting as
I did, as the agent of the Deity, it had to
be done." Guiteau confessed that he had
conceived the idea of removing the Pres-
ident about the middle of May, but couldn't
make up his mind to commit the deed, until
about the first of June. Quick as thought
Judge Porter asked, "You then made up
your mind; I thought you were acting under
inspiration?"
Thus the keen lawyer toyed with the
witness like a cat with its prey. Pen can-
not describe that wonderful presence, the
piercing glance of the eye, the earnest tone
of the voice, the pointed finger with which
he held the witness to the subject in hand,
and withal, the commanding dignity of the
man as he stood there plying the questions
thick and fast. Guiteau fairly wriggled in
his seat. His theory of inspiration was
going to pieces, and he himself giving the
worst evidence against the defence. Mr.
Scoville sat nervously in his seat, power-
less to help his client, for so shrewdly were
the questions put that no opportunity
was offered for an objection.
