

Moving Of NATO Council From Paris Seen Likely

LONDON (Reuters) — West Germany and Britain have agreed it probably will be necessary for the NATO council to leave Paris at some stage. British officials here said.

This agreement was reached at the final sessions of two-day talks on the NATO crisis between West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and British Prime Minister Wilson.

The NATO council is the top political organ of the 15-nation alliance and its headquarters are now in Paris.

The crisis was ignited by France's decision to withdraw from NATO's integrated defence system.

The officials said the West German and British foreign ministers, Gerhard Schröder and Michael Stewart, did not discuss where the NATO council should be located.

Informed British sources said it now seems highly likely the council might move to Brussels, Belgium, which also might be the new site of the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe and his headquarters.

The commander, U.S. Gen. Lyman Lemnitzer, now has his headquarters outside Paris.

The West German and British ministers also reached agreement Tuesday on the position they hope to see adopted by the other NATO Allies at a key NATO conference in Brussels June 7-8, when they meet France in the 15-nation ministerial council.

They also agreed on what was desirable for the reorganization and streamlining of NATO in the wake of de Gaulle's moves.

Veterans Minister To Retain Operation Of Institutions

OTTAWA (CP) — Veterans Minister Tillet said his department may retain responsibility for operation of most veteran institutions "for some considerable time."

These did not include Sunnybrook and Ste. Foy, he said, and negotiations for transfer of these hospitals to University of Toronto and Laval University "are progressing satisfactorily."

Plans already have been initiated for modernization of several hospitals and a joint project with the defence department was being considered for the hospital at Victoria. While both departments would share costs of a 60-bed extension, the veterans affairs department would continue to administer the hospital.

He also announced that the pension survey commission, formed last year, already had held 29 days of public hearings and is expected to submit its report by the middle of August.

Observance of national Veterans Week during the centennial year will start with Memorial Sunday on June 11, he said. The second Sunday in June had been selected for the observance to get the best possible weather pinpoint any single event in any single war.

The agreement with New Brunswick for operation of Ridgewood health and occupational centre at Lancaster, N.B., was working out exceptionally well, he added, and the Edmonton veterans home, a joint project with the province of Alberta, should be ready for occupancy by the end of the summer.

"With the above exceptions, it now appears that we may retain responsibility for the operation of most of our other veteran institutions for some considerable time," he told the Commons committee on veterans affairs.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH

The bidding:
South West North East
1 ♠ Pass 1 ♠ Pass
2 ♠ Pass 3 ♠ Pass

Opening lead—five of spades. How should you play the hand at three notrump? If you win the king of spades with the ace and try to establish the clubs by leading the ace and a low club, hoping for a 3-3 break, you are likely to go down in most hands in the actual hand you would surely go down.

West would win the club with the jack, play the Q-J and another spade, and the hand would later collapse after East shows up with four clubs.

However, if you attack the play properly, you are a strong favorite to make the contract. The aim should be to take ad-

vantage of dummy's hearts, even though there are entry problems which seem insuperable.

What you do is win the spade lead with the ace and cash the K-Q of diamonds to learn whether or not the diamonds are divided 3-2. Once you see that they are, you are sure of making the contract.

You now cash the ace of hearts and then lead the jack of diamonds, being careful to overtake it with the ace. Next you play a heart to force out the king.

The effect of this line of play is that you make three heart tricks and thus assure three trump. The three of diamonds is an entry to the six so that you can cash dummy's hearts after you have established them.

It is of course possible for the diamonds to be divided 4-1, in which case the method of play suggested could not succeed. However, you would find this out as soon as you cashed the K-Q of diamonds and would still have time to try to develop the clubs instead.

A 3-2 diamond break (a 68 per cent chance) is far more probable than a 3-3 club break (36 per cent), and diamonds is obviously the right suit to play at the start. All you have to do is be sure to treat the diamonds gently.
