

Clay, Rock Falls Catch Workmen

GEORGETOWN — What might have turned out to be a fatal accident occurred on Saturday morning at Georgetown, when two workmen were trapped and partly buried in a cave-in of an excavation at the intersection of Richmond Street and Weeks Crescent.

The men, reported to be Willard Peters and Stirling Doucette, both of Rustico, were working in a 12 to 14-foot trench in which a large concrete pipe is being laid as part of the sewage and waste disposal system being installed in the town.

The workmen were removed from the trench after being almost completely covered by clay and rock from the caved-in area.

CUTS AND BRUISES
One man received a blow on the head from falling rock and both received cuts, bruises and abrasions.

Vandalism Wave Hits Georgetown
GEORGETOWN — Despite long hours on duty by Georgetown's two policemen, reports continue to mount of increasing infractions of the law. The longer hours of darkness seem to have brought on a continuing series of infractions. Last week there were reports of three cars being broken into on the Bathurst Marine Ltd. parking lot while the night shift was working and three spare tires stolen from the cars. One man left his car unlocked in the downtown area and a number of articles were stolen from it. Another man had two tires on his car slashed and ruined. Bicycle tires were punctured and slashed in the area of St. James Church during an evening service.

TICKETS STOLEN
A traffic ticket book was stolen from the car of the assistant policeman and it is reported that a quantity of tools was stolen from one of the pulp yards where machines are engaged in rozing pulp wood. Continuing reports of gasoline theft are being heard almost daily. Speed zone signs, stop signs and street signs have been torn down and in some cases destroyed. False telephone calls have been received by the police of supposed infractions of the law which, when investigated, proved not to be taking place. Citizens are asked to pass on to police any information they may have pertaining to law infractions.
