No results of the inter-class competition were available last evening, but will be announced at the earliest possible time.

Volunteers who assisted at last evening's clinics included representatives of the following groups — Zonta Club, Ladies' Aid of the Central Christian Church, Birchwood, Queen Charlotte and Notre Dame high school Red Cross councils, and local nurses.
