SEAMEN'S MEETING.—A meeting of the shareholders of the Canada Atlantic Steamship Company was held at the Queen Hotel yesterday afternoon. The directors submitted their report to date, which was presented by the chairman, Mr. B. W. Chipman, and cordially received by the stockholders present, all of whom congratulated themselves that the contract for the new steamer had been made before the recent advance in price of steel and shipbuilding materials generally, thus effecting a saving to the company of at least \$16,000. Capt. Hill, late of the Furness line, has been engaged to command the first steamer of the new line, and is now on his way to Scotland to see that the building contract is strictly carried out. With such a splendid ship as this one will certainly be, and such high speed, plying between the hubs of New England and New Scotland, a large development of the passenger traffic will unquestionably result.—Halifax Chronicle. Chappelle returned home via Summerside yesterday, after having spent a very pleasant vacation. He brought with him a very large quantity of express goods for the accommodation of parties expecting the same. Prince Phillips, of Bourbon, son of the Duke of Aquila, and nephew of the Emperor of Brazil, has been sentenced by default to pay \$3,000 francs damages for swindling a priest in a jewellery transaction. The *Krons Zeitung* and the *Post* both have had reports from San Remo regarding the Crown Prince and says that tracheotomy will probably be necessary earlier than has been expected. The Crown Prince experiences difficulty in breathing. It is reported that the doctors have resolved to resort to tracheotomy immediately, as further delay might result in suffocation.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Fisheries Commission. OTTAWA, Feb. 14. Hon. Mr. Foster was interviewed relative to the Fisheries Commission, but he would not undertake to say what feeling prevailed among Washington politicians with reference to the work of the Commission. The fisheries question was only one of many things to be considered, and the fact that nothing had been placed before the people to discuss allowed no chance of expressing an opinion. There will be no real expression of public opinion until negotiations are concluded, and Mr. Foster added, if there should be a treaty, it will be forwarded to the Senate and opinion will then be plentiful enough. Of course, the treaty would have to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament, and the Legislature of Newfoundland as well, for ratification. Irish News. LONDON, Feb. 14. A Cabinet Council to-day decided to instruct the Irish Executive to cease prosecuting newspapers for publishing reports of meetings of suppressed branches of the League. Arrangements have been made for a division of Parnell's amendment on Thursday. The Conservative whips are confident they will have a majority of 85. For Temperance Men. TORONTO, Feb. 14. The annual meeting of the Grand Council of the Ontario Royal Templars of Temperance commenced here to-day. The report of the Secretary showed a total membership of 6439, a net gain of 123 during the year. Financially the year has been a most successful one, a balance of \$179 being in the treasury after paying off all liabilities. Another Railway Disaster. BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 14. A portion of the Union Elevated Railroad in process of erection on Broadway fell this morning near the junction of Broadway and Summer Avenue, killing three men, fatally injuring two, and wounding several. The New President. LONDON, Feb. 14. It is officially announced that Sir Michael Hicks-Beach has been appointed President of the Board of Trade in place of Lord Stanley, who will succeed Lord Lansdowne as Governor General of Canada. Smelt Fishing. OTTAWA, Feb. 14. The Minister of Fisheries, in view of representations made that boisterous weather had prevailed in the Maritime Provinces for some weeks past, has extended the season for smelt fishing to the end of February. Certain of Success. LONDON, Feb. 14. Joseph Chamberlain announces that he hopes to resume his place in the Commons on the 12th March. His friends state that the fishery negotiations are certain of a successful result. Gone Wrong. MONTREAL Feb. 14. A. D. Lemay, broker was arrested to-day for obtaining money under false pretences from J. N. Provencuer. Bail was refused. Heavy Snow Storms. LONDON, Feb. 14. There have been heavy snow storms in the west of England, Scotland and Wales. Trains are snowed up between Bath and Bristol. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, Feb. 15—10 a. m. Fresh to strong west and north winds; decidedly colder weather, with light snow falls in some localities. Supreme Court. WEDNESDAY, Feb. 15. The Court has been engaged since yesterday hearing a motion to quash two convictions made by the Stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown against John Hughes and Philip Curley. The Magistrate convicted the parties for a breach of the Scott Act, upon a sale being proved to have taken place on premises owned by them. The defence was that they had leased the bar-room, &c., to the party who made the sale, and that beyond being the landlords they had no interest in the premises or the business transacted therein. The Magistrate was of opinion that the leases were only colorable, and mere contrivances to evade the Scott Act. The defendants, being dissatisfied, had had the proceedings removed by certiorari.—Peters for defendants; W. S. Stewart for the prosecution.
