City Industries.

SOME years ago, when Alexander McKenzie ruled the roost, and David Laird was "Big Injun" in the Great North-West, and Louis Henry Davies was earning goodly fees from both the Local and the General Governments, there stood at the corner of Queen and Sydney streets a large brick building—vacant, silent, and useless. It was known as the "Brenan property"; and was regarded as an appropriate monument to the memory of a venerable citizen who had made the pile, and passed away. His spirit had fled, and his body was quiet and silent in the grave: its business was gone, and it remained quiet and silent above the ground. But time changes all things. The writer passed the spot this morning. What a change! The old building was full of life. Customers were at the counters. Busy clerks were selling goods at the cheapest prices ever known. On every floor skilled workers were employed; and the whole place was musical with the hum of busy industry called forth under the favoring National Policy breeze, and the enterprise, energy and practical ability of Messrs. Dorsey & Goff.

In those good old days—for McKenzie, Laird and Davis—there was another notable property in Charlottetown, the building tenantless and silent, the grounds overgrown with weeds,—the whole falling into ruin. But now, presto! it is the site of a thriving soap factory, and every man in the Island,—even the most active and unscrupulous of Grit mud-slingers—may, and should wash with the excellent soap, manufactured and sold by Messrs. Beer & Sons, and be clean.

Still another ruin was seen in those days by everyone who passed to and from the city by way of the Malpeque Road. It was practically valueless—a dead loss to those who owned it. But now it is the scene of thrifty industry—full of machinery and artisans—working on full time—manufacturing the wool produced by our farmers—into cloth of excellent quality for the clothing needed by the people—and yielding, we hope, a good living profit to those who comprise the Charlottetown Woolen Factory Company.

A vacant spot on lower Water Street has lately been utilized and rendered valuable by Messrs. Robert Palmer & Co., who have erected a new Sash and Door Factory, and imported first-class machinery, and who now employ as many first-class men as they can obtain, while their "hum" is often heard long after the usual working hours.

The foregoing are some of the new industries, which have been established in Charlottetown. There are also, some old ones which are worthy of note. "The Esdale Foundry and Machine Shop," is one of these. Since the good old days, of "jug-handled free trade," this prosperous establishment has experienced a wonderful development. A large addition has been made to the machine shop; a new brick foundry has been erected, and another boiler shop is used. About forty hands are employed and boilers, and engines, and castings of all kinds are being manufactured, not only for mills and factories in all parts of this Province, but for mills and factories in the neighboring Provinces as well. A short time ago several sets of castings were sent from Esdale Foundry all the way to Australia, where they will, no doubt, give satisfaction and reflect credit upon Messrs. McKinnon & McLean.

Messrs. Mark Wright & Co. have also made extensive additions to their Furniture Factory, and have lately imported several very valuable machines with the latest improvements; and they are doing about double the business ever done in the same establishment.

Mr. John Newson's Furniture Factory was unfortunately burned last winter; but his hands are at work on the premises occupied by Major Dogherty; and he never had a better demand.

These and other industries which might be mentioned, if we had space, are an unmixed good. They benefit the town and they benefit the country. For instance, most of the boots and shoes made by Messrs. Dorsey and Goff are made from leather produced in the country, and the wool used by the Charlottetown Woollen Factory is taken direct from the backs of our farmers' sheep, and the food consumed by all the operatives of all the factories, is the produce of our farmers and their wives, children and servants. So the country reaps its profits. The town is advantaged (1) by the increase of the value of property. The lands and buildings now occupied by the Shoe Factory, the Soap Factory and the Woollen Factory, and all the other factories, would not, practically, be of any value whatever—indeed, they would be a burden, for the owners would have to pay taxes—if it were not for the productive industries which are being carried

on in them. Then, the owners and operatives must all be housed, and so the value of house property is higher than it would be if they were not here. In those "good old days" to which we have referred, hundreds of houses were vacant in this town, and the printers were often employed in printing slips of "house to let." But now—walk the streets from one end of the town to the other,—and the number of good eligible dwellings found empty will be found to be very few indeed! What's the cause? The chief cause is that there is a greater number of working business men in the town, on account of the growth of our city industries! These men have their families who live in the town, and increase its trade. The forty artisans employed by McKinnon & McLean, for instance, represent from one to two hundred inhabitants, all of whom would either leave the town, or cease to be producers, if their establishments were closed. And if they were not here, the population, business and profits of the town would be so much lessened, while the burden of taxation borne by those who remained would be by so much increased.

The City industries, too, help one another. Thus the prosperity of Messrs. Mark Wright & Co. makes necessary a larger and better boiler and engine for their factory. The consequence is that Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, and their artisans are now employed in doing the work;—and the more industries there are, the greater will be the demand for such mutual assistance.

The very great importance of these industries, the desirability of promoting their increase, and the inexpediency of doing anything which will in any way show that we are not awake to the advantages of having them in our midst, are then apparent.

Now, we do not wish to claim for the National Policy anything which may not fairly and legitimately be claimed for it. The success of the city industries, now prospering in Charlottetown, is no doubt, due in great part, to the skill, energy and enterprise, of those who control them, to advertising in THE DAILY EXAMINER and THE WEEKLY EXAMINER, to the good times which prevail throughout the country, and to other causes. But it is an undeniable fact that several of the factories of Charlottetown would never have been started, would never, perhaps, have been thought of, but for the advantages afforded their proprietors by the National Policy and the thought and discussion, incident to its establishment and maintenance, which was brought to bear upon the subject of home manufactures.

We are, therefore, justified in asking the people of Charlottetown to do nothing which may even seem to show that they do not fully appreciate the advantages which our city industries have derived, and are deriving, and will continue to derive, from the National Policy.

The Qualification of Voters at the Coming Election.

Every voter must be a male person, of the age of twenty-one years, a British subject, not subject to any legal incapacity, and must have been duly qualified for at least twelve months next before the teste of the Writ of Election; and must, in addition, be entitled to one or more of the following qualifications:

First.—For an Electoral District must own a Freehold Estate of the clear yearly value of Forty Shillings, consisting of any Warehouse, Shop or other Building, or any Farm or piece of Land, or must be in the bona fide use and occupation, or actual possession of any such last mentioned premises.

Second.—For an Electoral District, except in the City of Charlottetown, the performance of Statute Labor, or Commutation Money for the last year, for which the same shall have become due next before the day of holding the said Election, together with the Overseer's Certificate, and a twelve month's residence in the Polling Division, or holding a situation exempting from Statute Labor by Act of Assembly.

Every Mortgagee or Cestui qui trust in actual possession by himself, or his tenant, of Real Estate of the yearly value of Forty Shillings, Dower Land set off and reduced into possession, and value Forty Shillings per year.

The clear yearly value as aforesaid to be estimated by the annual value of the buildings, or by the value of agriculture or other produce yielded by the land.

In the City of Charlottetown, in case no Provincial poll tax shall be imposed, then every male person of the age of Twenty-one years and upwards, being a British subject, and not subject to any legal incapacity, shall be entitled to vote as aforesaid, who, being liable to pay Civic poll tax for Charlottetown and Common, shall, in the event of any Civic poll tax being imposed by the City Council of Charlottetown, have duly paid such tax, or, in the event of the said tax exceeding seventy-five cents, shall have duly paid seventy-five cents of such tax for the year immediately preceding the teste of the Writ of election in which he claims to vote; provided always, that every person claiming to vote by virtue of Civic poll tax qualification shall have resided in Charlottetown and Common and Royalty twelve calendar months, and in the polling division in which he shall claim to vote, twelve months next before the teste of the Writ for said Election, and shall produce to the Deputy Returning Officer, if required so to do by him, or any candidate or the representative or agent of any candidate, a receipt or certificate in writing, subscribed with the name of the Collector of said tax in the District wherein such person claiming to vote shall have resided, testifying to the effect that such person hath duly paid such tax, or, in case the same exceed seventy-five cents, then, that such person hath duly paid seventy-five cents of said tax at any time within

twelve months before the teste of the said Writ of Election.

Every Liberal-Conservative voter should see that his qualification for voting is complete before entering the Poll Booth, in order that he can answer the Deputy Returning Officer all questions regarding his right to vote, and it need be, swear to it, because if the voter once refuses to swear to his qualification he will not be again permitted to enter the Polling Booth.

SEE THAT THE DEPUTY RETURNING OFFICER'S INITIALS ARE ON THE BACK OF THE BALLOT, AND DO NOT QUIT THE STATION UNTIL YOU SEE YOUR BALLOT DEPOSITED IN THE BOX.

Remember that the Poll opens at NINE A. M., and closes at FIVE P. M.; therefore vote early and take a friend with you.

In marking your ballot, place only a cross opposite Dr. Jenkins' name—put nothing more and nothing less.

Under no circumstances, whatever, should the voter answer any question put to him by the Grit inspector or agent. The Returning Officer alone has a right to put any questions, and to him alone should the answer be given.

The Lobster Fishery.

FURTHER representations as to the unfavorable weather for our lobsters fishery, having been made to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, it is understood that an additional extension of time, for at least five days, will be granted to our lobster fishermen. This will make the season fifteen days longer than it is under the law. The extension will be a great benefit, particularly to fishermen in the Western part of the Island.

A Loan Wanted.

LONDON, Aug. 15. The Egyptian Government has applied to the Alexandria Banks for a temporary loan. The banks refused to negotiate unless they have official assurance that the English Government will approve of the required advances.

LONDON, Aug. 15. The Government has notified ship owners that it cannot undertake to intercede with foreign Governments to obtain exemption from quarantine. If quarantine regulation time is infringed upon, captains must comply to the consuls.

PARIS, Aug. 15. Rumors are flying about to the effect that the French flagship suffered severely during the bombardment of K-lung. It is reported also that the French were repulsed when they landed, and that they failed to spike the guns.

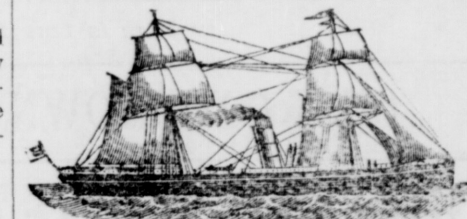
