### Little York Notes.

**New Houses.**—Mr. Thomas Vessey is  
just finishing what will be one of the finest  
and most complete residences in the  
neighborhood. The length of the main  
building is 26 feet, with a frontage of 26  
feet; and on the north side, in addition to  
this, there is an ell of 10 feet commencing  
in the rear and extending half way to the  
front, and finishing in a verandah running  
to a line with the front. The style of archi-  
tecture is a story and a half with a French  
roof. There are six large dormer windows  
in the main building, two of them in the  
front. These are all finished with heavy  
brackets reaching to the spouts. The eaves  
also are finished with heavy brackets.  
Down stairs the rooms are 10 feet from  
floor to ceiling, and upstairs 9 1/2 feet. Each  
room is supplied with a good sized closet  
and means for heating in winter. In the  
main building there are 11 rooms. There  
is also a kitchen finished uniform with the  
house. It is 25 feet by 18. The cellar  
runs the whole length of the house and  
kitchen, and is walled right from the bot-  
tom, and made frost-proof; it is seven feet  
deep. Mr. Henry Rackham, of Charlottetown,  
is the builder of this as well as  
several other handsome residences in this  
District, and has done his work with entire  
satisfaction to Mr. Vessey. The building  
is a credit to the settlement, and the owner  
will, no doubt, find it a "comfortable place  
to live in."

Mr. David Brown is building a very fine  
dwelling house, occupying one of the most  
commanding sites in the neighborhood.  
The house is 36 feet by 26, with 14 feet  
posts, and a good high pitched roof. The  
rooms, both upstairs and down, are over  
9 feet high. From the upper windows a  
most extensive view of the surrounding  
country can be obtained. An extra wide  
hall gives the house a very comfortable ap-  
pearance. Each room is well provided with  
a good closet. The cellar is large, and  
the walls well built. A large kitchen is  
to be built as soon as the main building  
is completed. Mr. James H. Auld, of  
Covehead, is the builder, and has done his  
work-up in good style.

Mr. Thomas Lawson, who has recently  
entered the Army of Benedictis, is building  
a house and store quite near the railway  
station. The frame is 23 feet by 26, with  
14 feet posts. The store will be about 12  
feet square. The roof is of a good servicable  
pitch. Mr. James Brown is the builder.  
The store when opened will be a great con-  
venience to the settlement, and, no doubt,  
if supplied with a suitable variety of goods,  
will do a large business. Few places need  
a store more than Little York.

### Meteorological for August—Local.

**Atmospheric Pressure.**—The mean  
atmospheric pressure reduced to sea level  
was 29.961. The greatest pressure (30.241)  
occurred at 8 a. m. of the 21st, and the  
least (29.513) at 4 p. m. of the 17th, giving  
a monthly average of 0.728 in.  
**Temperature.**—The mean temperature  
was 63.95, being 0.87 lower than the average.  
The highest temperature (85.4) occurred  
on the 5th, and the lowest (45.2) on the  
28th. The warmest day was the 7th, mean  
temperature 73.10, and the coldest the 27th,  
mean temperature 50.83.  
**Humidity.**—The mean humidity was 80.  
**Cloudiness.**—The mean amount of cloud  
was 0.53.  
**Total Precipitation.**—Rain fell on 12  
days to a depth of 2.349 in. Of this  
amount .404 fell on 15th.  
**Wind.**—Average velocity, without re-  
spect to direction, 7.67 miles per hour.  
Most windy day, 26th, mean velocity 15.75  
miles per hour. Least windy day, 15th,  
mean velocity 3.37 miles per hour. Great-  
est velocity in one hour, 25 miles, from noon  
to 1 p. m. of the 9th.  
**Aurora** on 5th, 10th, 11th, 12th, and  
18th.

### Chronology of the War.

As a matter of useful reference in con-  
nection with the Egyptian war, the follow-  
ing calendar of its most important events  
may be of interest.  
July 11.—Alexandria bombarded by the Eng-  
lish fleet.  
July 12.—Arabi Bey withdraws his army.  
July 13.—Alexandria occupied by the Eng-  
lish.  
July 18.—Kair-el-Dwar occupied by Arabi  
Bey.  
July 21.—Skirmish between English and  
Arabs at Mahalia.  
July 24.—Ramlieh occupied by the English  
with small loss.  
Aug. 2.—Skirmish near Meks. The English  
picked driven in.  
Aug. 3.—Suez occupied by English marines.  
Aug. 5.—Skirmish near Ramlieh. The Eng-  
lish retire.  
Aug. 15.—An English expedition set sail  
from Alexandria.  
Aug. 20.—Port Said occupied by the English.  
Aug. 21.—Small engagements at Shafat and  
Nefiche.  
Aug. 22.—An engagement at Serapeum.  
Aug. 24.—The English advance from Ismailia.  
Maglar captured.  
Aug. 26.—Ramses captured by the English.  
Aug. 28.—Kassassin occupied by the English.  
Aug. 29.—The English repulse a Bedouin  
attack at Kassassin.  
Sept. 7.—Brisk skirmish near Kassassin.  
Sept. 9.—Arabi Bey repulsed in an important  
engagement three miles west of  
Kassassin.  
Sept. 13.—Tel-el-Kebr carried by Sir Garnet  
Wolsey, Arabi put to flight, and two  
thousand Egyptians slain.  
Sept. 13.—General McPherson captured Zag-  
azig.  
Sept. 14.—Cairo surrendered to the British,  
ten thousand Egyptians lay down  
their arms. Arabi Pasha arrested  
and handed over to the British.  
The war has lasted nine weeks.

The Board of Trade enquiry into the  
stranding of the steamer "Lake Nepigon,"  
on the eastern coast of Ireland recently, de-  
cides that the Captain's error was one of  
judgment and not of wrongful act. His  
certificate is therefore returned to him.

### American Suspects in Irele.

The New York Times of the 18th says:—  
If the statements made by Mr. Henry  
George in his letter of August 26, filed at  
Washington on Saturday by his counsel, be  
correct they certainly present a case for the  
immediate and careful attention of the  
Government. The United States concedes  
to Great Britain the right to enact and en-  
force such laws as are necessary for the  
preservation of peace and order in her  
possessions, but it has a clear right that these  
be carried out in a full and friendly spirit  
and that American citizens shall have at  
least the same treatment as would be  
accorded citizens of Great Britain in  
this country. There is no doubt that a  
proper presentation of the case to the British  
Government would elicit a satisfactory ex-  
planation and reparation for such damages  
as Mr. George may be found to have  
suffered.

### Spanish Hostility to England.

From telegraphic news dated Sept. 19 we  
learn that a member of the Madrid Govern-  
ment says that Spain was solicited by  
Austria, Germany, and Italy to join the  
European concert. When the conference  
meets to discuss the English proposals for  
the settlement of the neutrality of the Suez  
canal and the conditional self-government  
under the suzerainty of the Porte, these  
powers with Turkey and Russia desire to  
find a Latin and Mediterranean nation to  
counterbalance the evident French sym-  
pathy with British policy. The Madrid  
Government will be, in the conference,  
decidedly adverse to any solution that might  
increase British preponderance in the  
Mediterranean. Public opinion in Spain  
is unanimous against the British power,  
which the Spaniards consider dangerous  
for their policy in Morocco. As long as  
England holds Gibraltar she will find them  
ready to unite with the Eastern powers  
against her influence in Europe and the  
colonies. "Never before has public opinion  
shown so great and bitter hostility to any  
European nation. Besides, the court and  
the Government think the opportunity  
excellent for Spain to resume her place  
among the great powers."

### Simplicity is Refinement.

Of fashions at a French watering-place a  
writer in the London Truth says: "I have  
learned the value of simplicity as a quality  
in dress since I came here—and I have also  
learned its cost! Yesterday a lovely Rus-  
sian girl made quite a sensation among the  
crowd of over-dressed, bunched out, befrilled  
fashion puppets by appearing in gray  
linen made with almost aggressive sim-  
plicity. The folds were caught in at the waist  
by a plain silver belt, and fell thence to her  
feet in straight lines. At the back the  
dress just touched the ground. Her gloves  
were gray suede, reached to the elbow, and  
fitted as exquisitely as her dress, and the  
cut of which was simply superb. To look  
at her was to recognize at once the true  
refinement that lies in simplicity. On the  
other hand, there are few figures with such  
faultless lines as this girl's, and there are  
many ladies, who, in such simple attire,  
would resemble a Mrs. Gamp or a bathing-  
woman."

### A Comparison.

General Wolsey's night attack on Arabi  
Pasha suggests to Mr. Douglas Brydner a  
successful night attack which was made on  
Canadian soil. In the war of 1812 the  
American, with a force of 3,500 infantry,  
250 cavalry, and nine fieldpieces, were on  
their way to Burlington Heights to assault  
the British position there. General Vin-  
cent and Lieut. Colonel Harvey were in  
command of the British troops, which con-  
sisted in all of 700 men. It occurred to  
Lieut. Colonel Harvey that by a bold stroke  
the Americans might be prevented from  
reaching Burlington Heights. He there-  
upon suggested to the general a night at-  
tack upon the enemy. The proposal was  
accepted, and the seven hundred men were  
marched in the dead of the night in the  
direction of Stony Creek, where the enemy  
was. The troops moved in perfect order,  
and in profound silence. The sentries at  
the outposts of the American camp were  
bayoneted in the quietest manner, and the  
camp was stormed. The result was a per-  
fect rout of the invaders, and the cap-  
ture of all their guns, two brigadier-  
generals, one field officer, one major, five  
captains, one lieutenant, and 116 non-  
commissioned officers and privates. The  
entire action lasted only three-quarters of  
an hour. The attack, like that upon Arabi,  
was sudden, unexpected, and decisive.
