Agricultural Meeting

At St. Anthony's

A very large and enthusiastic meeting in the interests of the Federation of Agriculture was held on Feb. 16th, at St. Anthony's Parish Hall. Places represented were: Fortune Cove, Dufferin, Bloomfield Corner, Howland, Woodstock and Rosebank. Mr. Irving Hardy was appointed chairman and Mr. Desmond Gallant, secretary. Mr. Charles Yeo of St. Eleanor's, President of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture addressed the meeting, stressing the need of marketing boards for even distribution of our farm products. He pointed out the fact that farmers are the only class of people who are not organized.

Mr. Cyrus Poirier of Summerside, secretary of the Prince County Federation, spoke on organization and gave details of the farmers meetings to be held in each school district on Feb. 28th. Farmers would be asked to vote on two questions: "Are you in favor of not marketing boards?" "are you in favor of not daylight saving time?" Mr. Poirier said it was about time farmers made their own business, and not let big interests do it for them.

Both speeches were heartily applauded. Mrs. Robert Woodside, one of the three Directors elected for the first district of Prince County thanked the farmers for their splendid co-operation. Rev. Fr. Rooney of St. Anthony's Parish, gave an excellent address and deplored the fact that in these progressive times they were without electricity in many parts of the P. E. I. He considered it was a move in the right direction as it was County, Provincial, Dominion and International in nature.

The districts then appointed a chairman, a secretary and an alternate to call the meetings in their respective schools and obtaining memberships. Messrs. Yeo and Poirier dealt capably with many questions asked by the audience. A vote of thanks was extended to the speakers and to Father Rooney for the free use of the Hall, which was made so comfortable for the meeting.—O

Regent's Report

Annual reports which showed a tremendous amount of work completed during the year, both at home and abroad, were submitted by the officers and secretaries. The following remarks were submitted by the Regent, Miss Wanda Wyatt: "After listening this afternoon to the very fine reports of our secretary, treasurer and the various conveners, you must be impressed by the amount and diversity of the work undertaken by the Abegweit Chapter during the past year.

As a rule the financial statement is a good yardstick by which to measure the Chapter's activities, but although this shows a satisfactory amount of money made through bridges, rummage sale, tag days and a movie, etc. and disbursed on the work of the different departments, it is apparent that much time and energy were expended by the members on several projects which were undertaken with the chief purpose of exerting an influence toward the betterment of particular conditions and individuals. However, in spite of their importance, they have little or no place in a financial report. Their influence has been directed towards various levels of society, from the more unfortunate individual, to the Federal Government at Ottawa.

In June last it was my privilege as Regent of the I.O.D.E. in Summerside to take the initiative in forming a Citizenship Council to look after the interests and welfare of the new Canadians in Prince County, who had come from Europe to make their homes in a strange country. They had suffered untold heartbreak and hardships and the sympathy and practical encouragement, which we could offer these bewildered people, should help towards their adjustment in becoming contented and happy citizens. I remained on the Council, acting as your representative and assisting at several evenings given for them, until the Council
