**Famous Leaning Tower To Have New Diagnosis**

PISA, Italy, (Reuters)—Europe's most famous architectural invalid is scheduled for another diagnosis soon when Prof. Walter Kjelman of the Swedish Geotechnical Institute begins to probe the soil beneath the leaning tower of Pisa. Kjelman will take the controls of a special sounding apparatus he invented which has been borrowed by Italian scientists to study the sagging soil which has been the cause of the tower's chronic incline.  
He thus joins the growing company of distinguished diagnosticians who have prescribed everything from steel splints to cement injections since Pisa's marble landmark showed its first symptoms by giving a dignified lurch almost 800 years ago.  
All treatments have been unavailing. But, as Pisans observe without concern there's still plenty of time to try new ones. The tower is still leaning on schedule—about a quarter of an inch more annually—and at that rate it won't collapse for another 200 years.  
Old Problem  
A problem from its very beginning in 1173, the 180-foot tower began to lean even before it was completed. The first architect gave up in despair after his brainchild showed signs of bias and another builder completed the structure about 1350.  
Since then the tower has continued its wayward ways until now a plumb line dropped from its belfry top strikes the ground 17 feet from its foundations.  
Pisans have reason to hope that Dr. Kjelman's cure won't be too successful. The tower draws 60,000 tourists a year up its winding steps.

**Discuss Potato Market Prospects**

(By Harold Morrison, Canadian Press Staff Writer)  
OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's potato growers may find selling a little tougher next year with heavy supplies developing both in Canada and the United States, a committee of federal experts said today.  
Thus, potato prices, which currently have dropped from 1951 and 1952 levels, likely will continue to remain low in 1954, the committee said.  
Continuing its report to the annual federal-provincial agricultural conference, the committee made these forecasts:  
1. With production increasing, Canada's supply of fruits, particularly apples and grapes, likely will be more plentiful next year.  
2. With the exception of potatoes, the marketing outlook ap-

ears to be "relatively good" for most horticultural crops.  
3. Despite a drop in bee colonies, an "average" honey crop may be expected in 1954, but the maple syrup crop may be down, a lack of rainfall resulting in an inadequate sugar supply.  
4. Production of edible vegetable oils has reached an all-time high in Canada, but Canada still requires a lot more than she produces. Consumption for shortening and margarine reached 147,000,000 pounds in the 1952-53 crop year—105,000,000 pounds more than Canada produced.  
5. Supply of cereal, flax, corn, wheat, pea and soybean seeds likely will be sufficient for all domestic needs next year.
