SUPREME COURT.

On Monday John Ross jr., indicted for maliciously stabbing Daniel Hogan, was tried and convicted on the fourth count in the indictment which charged him with committing the offence with the intent to do grievous bodily harm. It appeared from the evidence that the prisoner and the prosecutor, who was under the influence of liquor, got into a brawl on Powell Street, about 11 o'clock on the night of the 1st of June, and the Ross, who was very drunk, finding that he was getting the worse of it, drew his knife, and inflicted a slight wound upon his adversary's breast. This was not denied on the trial, but the defence set up was that the prisoner had been acting solely in self-defence. The Court met again on Tuesday morning, but after disposing of some unimportant civil cases, adjourned till to-day to hear appeals and Summary suits. The following are the sentences passed on the criminals convicted at this Term.

Ellen DeCosta, Decent, 2 months imprisonment. John Ross, jr., Stabbing, 10 months imprisonment. Duncan J. Boyle, Assault, 12 months imprisonment.—1st.

Charlottetown has now the most commodious market house in the Lower Colonies; our farmers can exceed the Canadians in raising live stock, and it we are able to show our Colonial neighbors Drug, Confectionary, Dry Goods Stores, which they cannot surpass, what need we care about being left out of the Dominion? But we must stop lest we provoke a rejoinder in respect to the limited extent of our Hotel accommodation.—1st.

ELECTION FOR MAYOR.—The Election for Mayor, on Friday last, in the place of Hon. T. H. Haviland, resulted in favor of Thos. DesBrisay, Esq. The Hon. Dr. Young was proposed, but as he was and is absent from the Colony, and is not known to be anxious for the Civic Chair, the vote cast for him was very small, being only fifty-six. The election created little or no excitement, and was not viewed as a party contest at all.—1st.
