A most interesting case has just been concluded in the Police Court at Truro. Mr. W. M. McVicar, Principal of the Model School, was cited last Saturday to appear before the Recorder to answer to a charge of thrashing a boy too severely. There seemed to be a difficulty about getting counsel to prosecute, and the case was adjourned till 24th when Mr. W. F. McCoy, of Halifax, appeared for the prosecution. The Recorder has not yet given his decision, but promised to do so, as soon as his associate in the case had been consulted with. He, however, intimated that his mind was fully made up in the matter, and it is believed that the teacher will be fined. The whole town is very much excited over the matter. The boy, it is asserted, not only refused to obey, but used profane language. Public opinion is divided. Some think that the strap was used a little too freely, but are very much opposed to the course pursued by those who have been instrumental in having the case brought into the public court. Strong sympathy is expressed for Mr. McVicar, who in a very short time has shown great proficiency in managing the school.

CAPE TORMENTINE RAILWAY.—On the arrival of Sir Charles Tupper at Amherst on the 25th, he was waited upon by Messrs. McCully, M. D., E. C. Goodwin, Robert Goodwin, and Rev. Robert Wilson, of Baie Verte, Messrs. George Willet and Alexander Clark, of Port Egin, and Messrs. James Carroll and Alfred Eaynorth of Cape Tormentine, who presented the Minister with a series of resolutions passed at a public meeting, urging the great necessity of a branch railway from the Invercolonial to Cape Tormentine, to facilitate winter communication with Prince Edward Island by way of the Capes. Rex. Mr. Wilson was spokesman of the delegation. The Minister, in reply, said he fully appreciated the importance of the object they had in view and desired to do all in his power to carry it out. As traced the history of winter communication with the Island since that province entered Confederation in 1873. He described the difficulties encountered by the "Northern Light" and the efforts of his officials to keep up communication between the Island and the mainland with that vessel. He admitted the advantages and necessities of the Cape Tormentine route and said that he would do his best to meet the wishes of the people and further the best interests of the country. The delegation were very favorably impressed and withdrew much pleased with the result of the interview.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.

At the opening of his trial this morning Guiteau was given a few minutes to address the Court and read a paper in which he said: "He was determined every fact in the case bearing on the question of who fired that shot, Deity or me, should be presented; hence, everything connected with his personal, political or theological record must be developed." He places great stress on editorials from newspapers of last spring denouncing Garfield for the use of patronage inimical to the republican party and says he certain never would have shot the President but for them, and they should bear their just portion and responsibility as should also the doctors who actually killed him as except for their treatment he would be alive to-day. He was not afraid of death and was certain of his destiny as the Lord had inspired him to act as he did. Guiteau paid particular attention to cranks, warning them to keep away from him at the peril of instant death.

Several witnesses testified as to peculiarities of the Guiteau family tending to show the prisoner was not responsible for his actions, but no vital evidence was presented—as on previous days Guiteau frequently interrupted witnesses but was silenced by the threat of Judge Cox to have him gagged.

THOMASVILLE, Ga., Nov. 25.

In the absence of Mr. Lewis, yesterday, his house was robbed and his wife and young daughter murdered. No clue to the murderers.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.

Iron buoys from New Haven to Providence have been removed for winter, and spar buoys put in place of them. The Bartlett reef, off Stonington, has been discontinued, breakwater being now outside position of buoys.

BUFFALO, Nov. 25.

A disastrous fire broke out in the extensive planing mill of Dart & Bro., in the Ohio basin lumber district to-night. The mill was totally destroyed. The fire spread rapidly to immense lumber piles near by, and communicated with a large quantity of valuable black walnut belonging to Scatterd & Son. Estimated total loss \$110,000.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Boyd has accepted the challenge of Hanlan to row a race over the Thames championship course for the Thames championship and stake of £200 to £1000 a side.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

The steamer Brooklyn, at Liverpool, from Montreal and Quebec, lost eighty-one sheep and seventeen head of cattle and had cargo shifted.

CORK, Nov. 25.

In the municipal election to-day the Land League candidates were defeated in four of six contested wards.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Nov. 25.

The Spanish steamer Joacellans, from Liverpool foundered with all hands while entering this harbor. It is believed 15 persons were on board.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

The captain and nine men of the crew of the British bark Adept, abandoned at sea while on the voyage from St. John to London, landed at Cardiff. The remainder of the crew twelve in number are drowned. The German steamer Quinta, before reported ashore, was caught in a typhoon in the China Sea and wrecked. No lives lost.

All on board the British ships Geraldine Paget and Bolton Abbey, wrecked on the Pratas shoals, have been saved.

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

"The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose."
