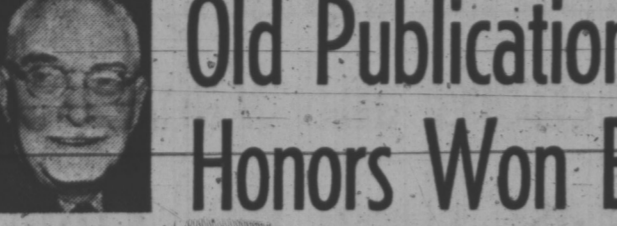

**VARIES WITH MOON**  
Easter can fall on any date between March 22 and April 25 and is calculated from a table assembled in the 16th century.

I'm not making direct reference to it, but the Maritime Winter Fair featured strong fox shows each year in this period. Doug Bell, Cape Traverse judged at Amherst in 1950.

Distemper was a menace to hogs and foxes, a 1951 magazine issue said.

A look at feed prices reveals that "frozen cooked ground chicken" cost three cents a pound in 1950. Hockemeat was seven dollars a hundred pounds, pork liver \$12.

B.B. Jones, Sunbury won top honors at the 1952 Maritime Winter Fair live mink show. Incidentally the biggest money winner at the old MWF for a number of years - this would be in the early 1950s - was George Callbeck, Summerside. He won heavily with foxes and he won heavily with standard bred horses, among other things. This is from memory but I believe he had approximately \$1,000 in total prize money one year. And the individual prices were low in those years compared with the magnificent \$100 first prizes for cattle at the Atlantic Winter Fair now.

As late as 1954 there were 270 foxes and 212 mink shown here in Charlottetown.

Clayton tells me that there were a total of 49 members when the first show was held in 1929. There were 139 members ten years later.

The first showing of mutation foxes, white faces, platinum, etc., was in 1940. Two years later the first championships were declared in the Mutation foxes.

**RECEIVED HONOR**  
It was in the fall of 1956 that the late Col. MacKinnon was honored by Canada's fur breeders. He received a testimonial address from leading fur business houses, publications and breeders, and a silver rose bowl filled with roses. Lloyd Lockerby presided at the dinner meeting.

George A. Callbeck had the top aggregate scores in foxes and mink in 1956. E.T. Mill was runnerup in foxes and Howell Hancock in mink. The Mill mink took the top aggregate the following year.

The Callbeck ranch was wiped out when Summerside needed the land for expansion but his foxes swept the aggregate again in 1960, as well as the mink aggregate. He was tops again in 1961.

Callbeck foxes took four grand and four reserve grand championships that year.

The aggregate score for foxes went outside the province to John MacInnes of Cabot Trail in 1963. Mr. Hancock topped the mink exhibitors.

John McInnis, English-ton, N.S. had the top fox aggregate in 1965 and Archie Neilson Sallisbury, N.B. topped the mink exhibitors.

**FIRST AUCTION**  
Mr. Hancock's magazine indicates that Canada Mink Breeders held the first auction of its kind, a special offering of the rarer types, Canada "Majestic" mink in 1961.

Canada Mink Breeders has done a tremendous job of advertising and glamorizing the country's mink since that time. Their advertising layouts have tremendous eye appeal. And past president Lowell Hancock tells me you don't have to have cash to buy mink now, they even have a financing plan to spread the payments.
