Annual Fishermen's Boat Races Held Yesterday At Pinette Attract Large Crowd

Fishermen's boat races at Pinette yesterday were witnessed by 1,000 people and the crowd was swelled by another 500 in the evening when "old time" dancing got into full swing.

The day was perfect from the weather standpoint, clear bright skies with the water ruffled by a slight breeze. Fishermen along the south shore of the Province from Pownall to Beach Point and Murray Harbor competed.

Five beautiful cups were completed for yesterday. The Lieutenant Governor DeBois cup for the fastest boat at the races was won by Elmer Carver of Pownall. The cup donated by Premier Campbell was carried off by Clarence Tanton. This was for the first time in the case of all marine engines. The cups donated by Hon. B. W. LaPage and by Maritime Packers, for winners in the six cylinder engine class went to Elmer Carver, winner of the Lieutenant Governor Cup for the fastest boat in the races.

In the free for all marine class Clarence Tanton of Pinette romped off with the cup donated by Elmer Carver of Pownall. It made the second cup for Tanton to carry home from the races. A cup donated by Bruce Stewart and Elmer Carver, for the winner in the class open to boats powered with 5 h. p. Imperial engines was won by Ben Miller, Belle River, when Warren Buchanan of Eldon was injured as his clothing became entangled in the propeller shaft of a racing power boat in which he was a member of the crew. The fast turning shaft stripped away all the clothing from his body before the engine could be stopped. The injured man was taken to Murray River to receive treatment.

Last night medical authorities there said the injured man was considerably bruised about the body and had a tear on his foot. No bones were broken, however, and apparently there were no internal injuries. The injured man drove to Murray River in a motor car and was able to return to his home after treatment.

Yesterday's events at Pinette were enlivened by the stirring strains of the Highlanders' Black and White Band.

It was the 5th annual fishermen's carnival to be held at Pinette and each year sees increased interest. Attendance was remarkable considering the number of counter attractions, including the Caledonia Club sports at Caledonia, only a few miles away.

Gallant Case Adjudged Until Friday

Slight progress was made yesterday in the trial of Arthur Gallant, charged in the Supreme Court here with receiving stolen securities. An adjournment was granted until Friday at 11 A. M. on application of the crown after two witnesses testified. Adjournment was to enable the Crown to bring Dr. Ralph P. Smith, of Halifax Provincial Pathologist to give evidence it was understood.

Witnesses to testify were Sub-inspector N. J. Anderson who completed his testimony began before the court adjourned Tuesday afternoon and Detective Corporal D. Cord and both of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Both were called by the Crown and told of investigating the break at the tobacco warehouse of D. J. Riley here on December 20th last. They told of preparing five ten-dollar bills with malachite green to be used as money to ransom the thousands of dollars worth of bonds and securities stolen from the safe in his office. They told, too, of the arrest of Arthur Gallant on the night of December 23 when the ransom money was paid and the stolen loot recovered following directions received by Mr. Riley over the telephone. Gallant was arrested leaving a house on Queen Street by Constable Lawrence McInnis, a member of the city police force. In his evidence previously testified Gallant's left hand stained bluish green.

Malachite green was a dry powder which turned a vivid bluish green color when it came in contact with anything damp, such as perspiring hands, Sub-Inspector Anderson declared in evidence.

Witnesses were examined for the Crown by Attorney General Thas A. Campbell and Frederic A. Large, assistant Crown prosecutor. Mr. J. Johnston, counsel for the defence conducted vigorous cross examination.

Chief Justice J. A. Matheson is presiding judge. Yesterday it appeared unlikely the case would go to the jury until early next week unless the Court sat on Saturday.
