THE cases reported a few days ago of a murderous assault at Logansville, Pictou, is worse than was supposed, and will probably prove fatal. The ruffian McDonald has decamped. He is about 20 years old, 6 feet high, of fair complexion, stoop shouldered, and has a large reddish roman nose.

QUEBEC now boasts in the Dufferin Terrace, the finest promenade in the world. It is 1,500 feet long, with an average width of 65 feet, and is about 186 feet above the level of the water at its feet. It commands a magnificent view, and is altogether a valuable addition to the picturesque of the most picturesque city on the continent.

A CENTRAL NEWS telegram, the substance of which appears in the Quebec *Chronicle*, says that it is believed Lord Dufferin will be appointed Governor of Asia Minor, transferring him from his post at St. Petersburg. The reforms needed in Asia Minor necessitate the employment of a master mind, and he is credited with having received the appointment.

THE London *Times* says the recent rise in cotton in Liverpool is a godsend to that long-suffering centre of commercial inactivity. But for this relief there must have been a crash, and nothing more opportune has happened in commercial affairs for a long time. While the rise is only temporary, it enabled banks and speculators to escape a perilous position, and has averted a collapse otherwise inevitable.

SIX DEATHS IN ONE FAMILY.—A short time ago the deaths by diphtheria were reported of three children in the family of Mr. Matthew Ferguson, of Hammond, King's County. Since then three more of his children have succumbed to the fearful disease; six children carried off from May 24th to June 7th, leaving only the father and mother to mourn over a desolate hearthstone.—*St. John Sun.*

A FIGHT originated on Dorchester Street yesterday evening. After the belligerents had pummeled each other considerably, the police arrived and arrested one of the party. He refused to go and resisted all the officers' endeavors to take him. He was at length carried bodily by four of the police, and a crowd of over two hundred spectators followed them to the station. A street brawl is a novelty in this quiet City.
