

# Virgil Trucks Pitches His Second No-Hit, NO-Run Game Of Season

## Former President Of N. Y. Yankees Visiting Jasper

JASPER PARK LODGE, Alta., Aug. 25 — Fresh from selling \$195,000 worth of his yearlings at Saratoga, Larry S. McPhail, former president of the New York Yankees, arrived here yesterday convinced that the Yanks would again sweep everything before them.

Mr. McPhail, accompanied by his wife, arrived at Jasper Park Lodge for a brief visit before continuing to Vancouver where they will sail aboard the C.N.S. liner "Prince George" for Skagway, Alaska.

Mr. McPhail was convinced the Yanks this year again will go through to take the World Series. "The Yanks are tough to beat when the chips are down," he claimed, adding "There's something about a Yankee uniform that makes a player just a little better than the others." He didn't think the recent spurge of the Cleveland Indians would bother the New York squad.

With his interest now devoted to raising horses and cattle at his farm in Bel Air, Maryland, Mr. McPhail recently sold 27 yearlings at Saratoga, N.Y. for more than \$195,000 and he is currently working on the rebuilding of Bowie Park, midway between Baltimore and Washington, at a cost of \$2,000,000. It is expected to be opened on November 17.

## Plan Allan Cup Calibre Hockey

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 25 — (CP) — Top-calibre hockey in New Brunswick will be of Allan Cup variety if plans laid at a meeting of hockey moguls here during the week-end materialize.

Three clubs — Fredericton, Saint John and Moncton — were represented at the meeting and their spokesmen visualized a league comprised of their own teams and clubs from north shore towns of New Brunswick and possibly Amherst and Springhill in Nova Scotia.

Saint John and Moncton had entries in the Maritime Major Hockey League season. Earlier spokesmen had announced that both clubs would enter Allan Cup competition during the coming season.

Federicton has been anxious for the past two years to enter a league with other New Brunswick cities in Allan Cup competition and hold-overs from last season's intermediate team will give them a strong start in the new circuit.

Further plans for the new league and possible new entrants will be discussed at another meeting to be held in Moncton next week-end.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 — (AP) — A reversed decision by the official scorer helped erratic Virgil Trucks pitch his second no-hit, no-run game of the season today as the last place Detroit Tigers nosed out New York Yankees, American League leaders, 1-0.

The husky, 33-year-old Tiger fastballer thus became the third major leaguer to hurl two no-hit games in the same season. The right-hander hurled the first no-hitter of his career May 15 when he hand-cuffed Washington by the same 1-0 score.

The change by the official scorer made this a unique masterpiece in diamond history.

Phil Rizzuto of the Yankees hit a bounding ball to shortstop Johnny Pesky in the third inning. Pesky appeared to field it cleanly, but juggled the ball while pulling it from his mitt to make the throw. When he did get the peg off, it bounced late and low to first base.

Official scorer, John Drebringer, veteran reporter of the New York Times, ruled it an error and then, after a moment's reflection, decided that the ball had stuck in the webbing of Pesky's glove and changed it to a hit.

Argued For Error

Other occupants of the press box argued that it should have been an error. Drebringer held firm for a while but, by the fifth inning, began to feel that there must be a reasonable doubt because of the insistence of other writers.

Drebringer was willing to consult Pesky on the matter. Pesky was phoned in the dugout before the seventh inning and readily took the blame.

"I had the ball and it squirted loose from my glove as I reached to take it out," he said. "I messed up the play."

Drebringer then announced the reversal.

At that moment the Tigers were putting together a double by Walt Dropp and a single by Steve Souchock for the only run off Bill Miller, rookie left-hander.

Trucks then began to press for his no-hitter. Yogi Berra, Gene Woodling and Loren Babe went down in order in the seventh.

In the eighth he started off by fanning Billy Martin. Casey Stengel then ordered two pinch-hitters to bat. Johnny Mize fouled out and Ivy Noren tied out.

The Stadium was a bedlam as the Yanks came to bat in the ninth. Mickey Mantle led off and, trying for a homer, fanned for Trucks' eighth strike-out.

Joe Collins then lined a long ball to centre and, for a moment, it seemed to be out of reach. But Johnny Groth raced over and took the ball at head-height.

Hank Bauer, the final batter, crashed a hard grounder but it went right to All Federoff, rookie second baseman, on one bounce. He threw to first and the game was over.

After the game, Trucks admitted he was happily surprised at the scoring change.

"I didn't think it was a hit when it happened," he said, "but who am I to criticize? I just went out and pitched as though they had made a hit. The hit was up there on the scoreboard over the bleachers."

"But when the change was made, I wanted to go all the way."

The only other no-hitter this year in the majors was turned in by Brooklyn's Carl Erskine against Chicago Cubs on June 19.

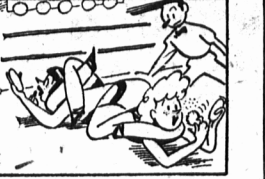
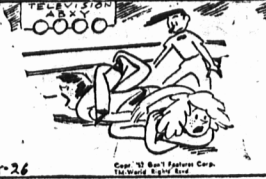
